

C.F.C.Y. Extends A Vote of Confidence

The announcement made jointly this week between Island Broadcasting Company and the St. Dunstan's Students' Union Inc. will undoubtedly be greeted with mixed emotions. On the surface it doesn't entail that much.

As the agreement between the two bodies aforementioned now stands, all home games of the St. Dunstan's Varsity Hockey Club are to be broadcast on C.F.C.Y. for the full 60 minutes. The hockey program will follow along the lines of the N.H.L. games covered by the American stations.

It goes like this: There will be a short (probably 3 minutes) terse briefing before the game. At the conclusion of each period, a brief summary will be given, followed by a news broadcast from the studio. A minute prior to the start of the next period, CFCY will return to St. Dunstan's for the play-by-play coverage.

This type of program has many advantages, but certainly the most obvious is that it does away with lengthy and often boring interviews between periods. There is nothing, absolutely nothing, that can ruin sports coverage faster than some mediocre and insignificant talking to fill in time. Too often they tend to hash out the same old material about the same old subjects ad nauseam.

So much for the techniques of the program. But just what does the game broadcast prove, and why all the fuss over it? Actually, the potential possibilities for radio coverage are unlimited, and this is just a start. For one, the very fact that CFCY, one of the most successful stations in the Maritimes, is willing to devote this time to Intercollegiate hockey in general and to St. Dunstan's in particular is unprecedented on Prince Edward Island. It is a vote of confidence in University sports.

For years now, the M.I.H.L. has strived for a top notch circuit of the calibre it now enjoys. That a private radio station of some stature is ready to go out on a limb for the league is an endorsement of great magnitude. But it means more than that for St. Dunstan's.

On paper, at least, St. Dunstan's has one of the best teams in the past decade or so. If the team can go out and make a respectable showing—many think that a respectable showing is a Maritime Championship—then the players will be the greatest public relations organ around here in history. With CFCY on hand to cover the games, a means of publicizing SDU is readily available. It is a two way street for the hockey team, and truthfully, it can be frightening as well as being wonderful.

I don't think that anyone can deny the fact that there have been more than a few matters which needed immediate repair or revision after last year's hockey season. I believe that in some respects, the administration and/or the Student's Union would be the first to agree. With respect to the revaluations one doesn't have to go very far to prove the point.

Everyone kept screaming for a time piece in the rink. You may have noticed a new clock at the west end has been inserted. People from the press complained that they had no facilities to work with when covering the SDU games. You may have noticed that a new press box above the exit on the south side is in the construction stage. Fans who attended the games in mass hordes demanded the right to know the players performing, and perhaps something about them. In other words they deserve either a program or a mimeographed sheet of paper, for the line-ups. It was the least that could be done. Now there is a strong possibility of having a program done this year.

It is a tedious and distasteful job complaining and harping of malfunctions around the campus. Now the fruit of labor is showing. It took time but it came. Coupled with the radio coverage, it will improve the athletic situation from a physical point of view immensely.

And all of these should mean a great deal to the students and to the club. Now the team has something to work with and work for. Right now a souvenir program is in the planning stages. Perhaps more can be done. But in the meantime, the players can prove—on the ice—that they merit it. The opportunity to do so is not that far off.

St. Dunstan's University Saints finished the home season schedule Saturday with a crushing 21-0 shut-out defeat to the fired up Dalhousie Tigers. As Coach Ed Hilton remarked after, it was a case of them wanting to win more than did the Saints. "They hit hard, ran hard, right from the opening whistle. They ran all over us."

The Tigers were led to victory by the headsup play of versatile quarterback, Bill Stannish, who scored two touchdowns and passed to Gary Sutor for the other. Stannish was also the leading yard gainer of the game with 109 yards on seven carries, followed by SDU's Jim Griffith with 95 on 11 rushes.

Dal had a total of 208 yards gained on passing compared to 71 by St. Dunstan's.

S. D. U. Ends Grid Season At U.N.B.

The Varsity finish their Atlantic Football commitments tomorrow with a game against U. N. B. Red Bombers at Fredericton. The Bombers are fresh from a 76-0 walloping from St. Francis Xavier last week at Antigonish.

Once again the Saints are facing the weekend with an injury riddled lineup. Several players are still nursing old wounds, and some have received new ones. Dave O'Brien may miss Saturday's game, Eddie Lawlor is still in the hospital, John Rodgers has a badly smashed left hand, and Cyril MacDonald still has the ill effects of some earlier injuries.
