## Discipline Committee To Be Appointed

In line with the major changes in the rules and regulations concerning the conduct and general welfare of the students on campus this year, a student discipline committee is soon to be appointed to act on behalf of the male student body.

Appointments to the committee are to be made by the Dean of Men, who in this regard, will work in consultation with the President of the Students Union. The latter shall preside at all meetings of the SDC. The Chief of the campus police shall be a non-voting member of the SDC.

Among the various powers of the Discipline Committee is

the right to levy fines — to a maximum of \$25.00 — for major offenses. Fines must be paid within two weeks, failure to do so will result in direct action by the Dean of Men.

However, any student has the right of appeal, providing he (even she) makes the appeal within 48 hours of notification and accompanies the appeal with five dollars. Should the appeal be accepted, the five dollars is returned.

A more detailed explanation of the rule changes and the work of the Discipline Committee may be found in the "Student Handbook," available free to all students.

## Pelaguis Jesse Charles, The Pasha Alias The Drama

The Saint Dunstan's University Drama Society was founded in the year of grace 653 by the Blessed Dunstan, then a monk of Tignish, whose love of drama was clearly reflected in the quality of his sermons.

In its early years, the society suffered many hardships not least among which was their horrible persecution at the hands of the Pelagians, whose despicable heresy was in those days prominent on the Island, and which heresy the Blessed Dunstan had combatted by writing a play in which their leader, Pelagius, was depicted as a toad. The plight of the society came to the ears of Gregory, Bishop of Rome and Pontiff of the Holy Church, who interceded with the Emperor palladius, next after Honorius and 64th successor to Augustus. This great Emperor of whom Virgil wrote:

"Great Palladius, when he hear the moan Of the afflicted, rose up angry from his throne," soon dispatched an army to wipe out the enemies of the society and their terrible doctrines (as well as their barbarous custom of eating with their feet).

This great army of justice was commanded by Sir Charles Dalton, a knight whose miraculous conversion to righteous causes had abruptly precipitated when his brothers (the Dalton Boys) were hung with Jesse James for cattle thieving and other disreputable activities herein unprintable.

Sir Charles defeated the Pelagians in a surprise attack when these unspeakably wicked people were having a beach party at Stanhope. In a stroke of strategic military genius, Sir Charles and his 500 Ojibway mercenaries seized all the heretics' beer, thus rendering them helpless and empty of courage. The heretics were then loaded into white slavers and taken to New York City where they were sold to leading department stores as clothes dummies. For his great work in restoring the society of drama to its just position of prominence and public veneration this noble knight was granted the title "Dramaticus", of which title he proved himself worthy by contributing large sums of money to a construction fund for an actors' club which was named Dalton Hall in his honour and which has been preserved to this day as an example of blind faith in structural durability.

Peace ended abruptly in the year of sorrow 1652. The Pasha of Tripoli, burning with jealousy and rage at the universal fame of the society, sent ships to ravage the poor Islanders. So wicked and cruel was the Pasha that he had been known to give only 50¢ in Sunday collection, and yet spend many times that amount on repairs to his summer home in Palm Beach. The Drama Society, however, devised a plan, and one day presented the Pasha with a potato which they claimed would give him eternal life. The Pasha, overcome with a lust for power (and obviously not having read the Old Testament) bit into the potato. Imagine his surprise when he found that the potato was full of nitroglycerine, and that his ugly Tripoli face was being blown apart and dispatched to various parts of the Island in various shapes and with very little dignity! As a fitting end to this horrible reign of terror the Islanders sang the "Te Deum" and "Gaudeamus" in gratitude for their deliverance.

Peace, unfortunately, has been our lot up to the present, and thus the St. Dunstan's University Drama Society has been deprived of further chances to lead the Islanders in glorious and gloomy conquest. We have had to content ourselves with such unimpressive and tedious feats as winning three out of six awards in last year's Dominion Drama Festival (P.E.I.) with our production of "A Man For All Seasons". I suppose that this year we shall be forced to do the same.
