Little Known Societies

With this issue we begin a series of articles on the little known "societies" existing on our campus. In doing this we hope to attain a double purpose: To inform the students on the role of these organizations and to increase active support of them.

In all probability 99% of S.D.U. students have not the slightest inkling as to the meaning of the letters C.C.S.M.C. save for the fact that they have something to do with the missions. They stand for Canadian Catholic Students' Mission Crusade.

During an interview with the moderator of St. Dunstan's Chapter, Rev. T. M. MacLellan, we learned that this organization antedates the present Students' Union. He stated that as far as was known it was introduced here by Msgr. R. V. MacKenzie, a former rector of the college.

The primary purpose of the organization is the constant presentation to the students of the missionary aspect of the Church. Of course, inseparable from this is the function of securing funds for the missions.

It was stated that during the 1960-61 scholastic year, approximately \$440 was acquired by the society for its diversified projects. This, it was noted,

was a substantial increase over prior years due mainly to the new system of fines, introduced last year. (So when you're slapped with a fine, at least you know it's going for a good purpose.) Other sources of income stem from the Sunday Collections, dances, skates, private donations, etc.

The diversified outlets for the income include: a Mass each week for an increase of vocations to the priesthood and religious life amongst our students, and the upkeep and additions to the religious pamphlet rack in the reading room of the library. Last year the society also gave a donation to Bishop MacEachern's Diocesan Latin American Fund, and helped to support a Seminararian from Kenya.

The executive of the C.C.S.M.C. include George Swift as President and Senior Representative Peggy Shea as Vice-President and Co-ed representative, David Ellsworth as Secretary treasurer and Junior representative, and John Flanagan and Bennet Campbell as Sophomore and Freshmen representatives respectively. High School representatives are yet to be appointed.

At present the society holds monthly meetings on the first Friday of each month at 4 p.m. in the Common office and all students are welcome to attend.

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
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
