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## CFCCS REVITALIZED

In a recent talk with Fred Duke, C.F.C.C.S. national president, we were pleased to detect a revival of intention within the organization. Last year quite a storm was created due to the seven point program advanced at the National Conference held at St. Mary's Union in Halifax. Many students thought, and rightly so, that CFCCS aims were a duplication of some of the aims of our campus organizations. However, a majority of the students (at least those present at a General Meeting) felt that CFCCS, as a bond of unity between the Catholic Colleges, was the essential thing. The motion to throw it out was voted down.

This year, however, we believe that the national program would be agreed to by even the most sceptical. In summarizing his views on the future, Mr. Duke stated that he would first make an effort to familiarize the Catholic students with CFCCS.

In line with a second function, CFCCS is presently acting as a consulting member with

U.N.E.S.C.O., NFCUS and WU SC. Mr. Duke hopes to play an active part in these organizations in expressing Catholic intellectual thought. He feels that one of the functions of CFCCS is to present Catholic Students' opinions before the Government, the Canadian people as a whole and whatever other bodies might demand it.

Another item, which in our opinion, will truly unify the Catholic Colleges is the concept of a Catholic news service. This is to be called C.C.U.P. — Catholic Canadian University Press.

One of the outstanding projects of this new program, however, is the proposed Foreign Student Leadership Workshop. The first workshop, sponsored by the Coady Institute of St. Francis Xavier University, is to take place in Montreal for one month next summer.

From a general view of the aims of CFCCS of this year, we may rest assured that its fine program will be actively implemented through the vitality of the new National President, and that CFCCS will grow and prosper.

If they had written this it would have been a literary masterpiece,

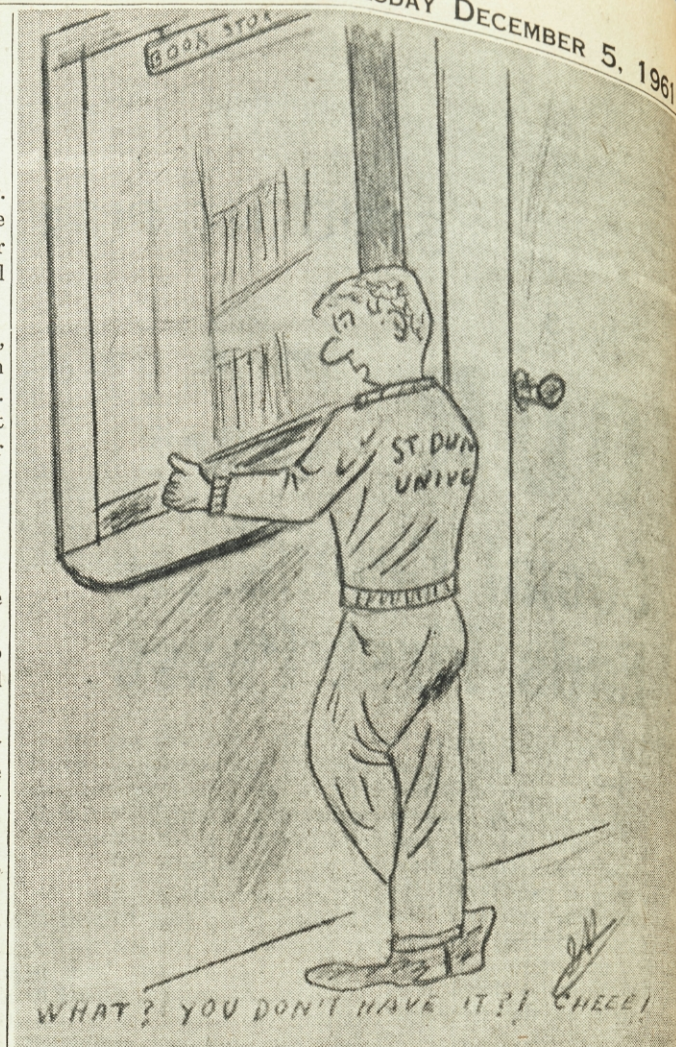
Since we wrote it it's complaining. Maybe it isn't really this bad but it does pull together a few stray truths, doesn't it?
