IN MEMORIAM

By the death of Reverend William Bowlan on May I Saint Dunstan's lost a highly respected alumnus.

Father Bowlan was born at Cardigan. He attended Saint Dunstan's College and while here he was a very active member of the first editorial staff of *Red and White*. From here he went to House of Phliosophy, Quebec, to continue his studies. He taught school at Rollo Bay before leaving for Calgary, where he was ordained in 1914 by Bishop McNally, the present Archbishop of Halifax. His was the first Ordination in the Calgary diocese.

Prior to his Ordination he taught school in a tent, and homestead in Sinnott Colony, near Humboldt, Saskatchewan. After his Ordination he took up mission work in Alberta. He served the Hanna and Oyen districts till 1922. He then came to High River where he also carried on service at Brent and Blackie, which included a large area in his clerical duties.

Illness forced Father Bowlan to retire from his active duties last fall. His passing is greatly mourned not only by his relatives and parishioners but also by the student-body of Saint Dunstan's. His great interest in our welfare was shown on many occasions when he very generously contributed articles to *Red and White*. Requiescat in pace.
