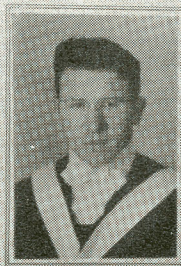
GEORGE FRANCIS MACDONALD

"Diligence is the Mother of Success."—Don Quixote

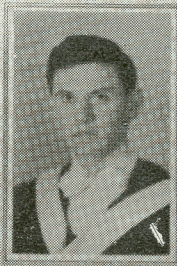

A troubled world awaits you George, but men of courage do not fail.

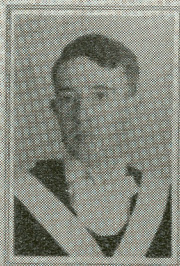

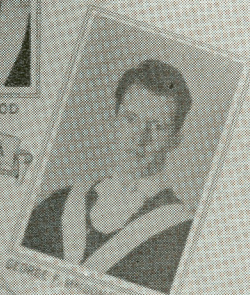
