

Saints Blast Furies 37-0

Dashing wingback, Len "Pigmy" Ellis, romped to three touchdowns, two on 80 and 60 yard runs, to pace the Saints to a 37-0 rout over the Shearwater Furies in the season's opening game at the R.C.N. base in Halifax.

Fine quarter backing by Gil Collins and Jim Pelrine, who shared duties at the helm, enabled the Varsity squad to roll to a 19-0 margin on two touchdowns by Ellis, one by Gillis, and a convert by Frank Garrity.

Then early in the second quarter, an intercepted pass by defensive end Bill Dolan enhanced the Saints' score by another six points as Bill on a 35 yard sprint bounded over the Furies goal line for a touchdown.

Furies tried to recover their wits in the second half, but the solid defensive work by Hilton's backers withstood the unleashed fury of the Furies. Again Ellis, in the third quarter, collected a beautiful hand-off from Collins and his TD this time boosted Saints' score to 31.

The last quarter saw the Saints running all over the Furies as the latter tried valiantly to hold back the squad from increasing their score as well as to pick up some points for themselves. But in the futile efforts of Shearwater, Gill Collins managed to pull off a quarter back sneak and raised the Saints' margin to a 37-0 victory in the final minutes of the game.

SDU Repeat Rout Of Furies

The fuming Furies from Shearwater, not satisfied with the previous 37-0 blast from the S.D.U. giants, returned here last Saturday to avenge their sufferings, and this time, they were licked, trounced, and sent packing to Eastern Passage, groaning over the 51-7 devastation by Saint Dunstan's Varsity.

From the blow of the first whistle, it was the Saints all the way. They galloped, they rushed, they bored every hole, and punted like mad, and at the end of the first half were leading by a 12-7 margin. This was due mainly to the outstanding on rush by Jim Bentham, who scored both touchdowns, and clever thinking by rookie quarter-back Jim Pelrine, who did a magnificent job in the absence of injured Gil Collins. Furies' touchdown was picked up by Ekholm who, receiving a quick kick, made a beautiful end run across the Saints' goal line.

But if the Saints were just stormy in the first half, they were thunderous in the second. "Pigmy" Ellis, having a field day during this period, picked up the Saints' third TD on three successive plays within the first three minutes. Then, Frank Garrity intercepted a

long pass and steam-rolled across the Furies' goal line to widen the Saints' margin to 25-7.

Despite the revived efforts of the Furies, the Varsity boys romped over them. Len Ellis showed them a few tricks, when he again dashed off to their goal line for two consecutive touchdowns, pacing the score to 38-7 against the Furies.

In the light of this mark, the fuming Furies became the fumbling Furies and on one of their furious fumbles, Ellis grabbed the ball, took off for his fourth touchdown, and thus increased the margin to 44-7. Welch and Davis had a busy day collecting the fumbles of the Furies.

With the score at 45-7 going into the last quarter, the Varsity boys were really nice to the Furies, who by now were a tame group. But this did not prevent Ellis from picking up his fifth touchdown of the game after running 60 yards from a lateral pass by Pelrine.

If ever our Varsity boys wanted to display the tremendous resourceful power, Coach Hilton has given them this was one time they really put it on. There is no doubt that the Acadia — S.D.U. game on November 4 is going to be the year's biggest thriller.

Saints Trounce X Men 25-12

The Varsity football squad scored its second victory in the Atlantic "B" Conference by crushing St. F. X. Juniors 25-12 on Saturday, October 14.

Saints carried the pace throughout the first quarter, allowing only two opportunities to the FX men, who made very little use of them, and by the end of the quarter, Saints were enjoying a 13-0 lead. A recovered St. F. X. fumble by Gerald Wynne and fine rushing by full back Jim Bentham enabled Saints to score the first T.D. Then Bob Simmons broke lose for a fifteen yard run to boost the second T.D. while Don Des-Roches punted for the convert, making the score 13 to St. F.X.'s 0.

Jim Bentham hit pay dirt early in the second quarter by running fourteen yards after a hand out by quarter back Gill Collins. With the score now 19-0 in favour of the Saints, it appeared that this was to be another of those Red and White slaughters but then the visitors came to life. Half back Bill Roy collected a hand off on a fake pass and sprinted seventy

yards to push the X men's score to 6.

But as though in retaliation Bob Simmons showing that he, too, could do some fine running, dashed for fifteen yards to score his second touchdown. Trailing by the score of 25-6 St. F.X. decided to either get moving or to push the Saints back. Bill Roy, receiving a Saints' punt, early in the third quarter and literally walked across the Saints' goal line unmolested to collect his second TD, thus putting the X men twelve points to the good.

The Xavierran's defence seemed to form a solid wall in the last quarter which caused our Red and White squad, unable to penetrate, to be contented with their 25-12 victory over the X men.

The Welshmen struck so quickly and fiercely, that within ten minutes of the kick-off they were leading 19-0. This was due to the brilliant team work of quarter back Bill Stanish and his offensive backers, Dave Rogers and Dave Crosby. All three were responsible for the three TD's.

But as it appeared that the Juniors were in for a terrific trouncing, Tom Lefsyk, on two successive rushing attacks of ten and fifteen yards, raced across P.W.C.'s goal line to register the Jayvees' first six points. Then, following a clever pass interception by Dave O'Brien, Walter Buote, two plays later, dived across the goal line for a converted touchdown, pushing the score to 19-13 with

the Saints trailing at the end of the first half.

Saints returned fresh early in the third quarter and evened the score at 19-9 on a passing TD play by Don Brown. Then Tom Levisyk, on a quarter back sneak, scored Saints' fourth goal and pushed them ahead of the Welshmen 25-19.

However, these were all the points Saints were going to score. Renewing their fierce attack, P.W.C., in the fourth quarter, scored a touchdown and a safety thus putting them into the lead 27-25 at the end of the game.

Axemen Get The "Axe"

The Saints, spirited by their previous loss to Acadia, took revenge last Saturday by trouncing them 25-13. Two TDs by Simmons and one by Ellis gave the Saints a 19-6 lead at half time and one by Lane closed scoring in the 4th quarter. Especially noticeable was the great work of the defensive team. Full coverage will be given in the next edition. The Saints now are tied for 1st place with St. F.X. JVs with Acadia in 2nd, Shearwater in 3rd and Dal JVs in the cellar.

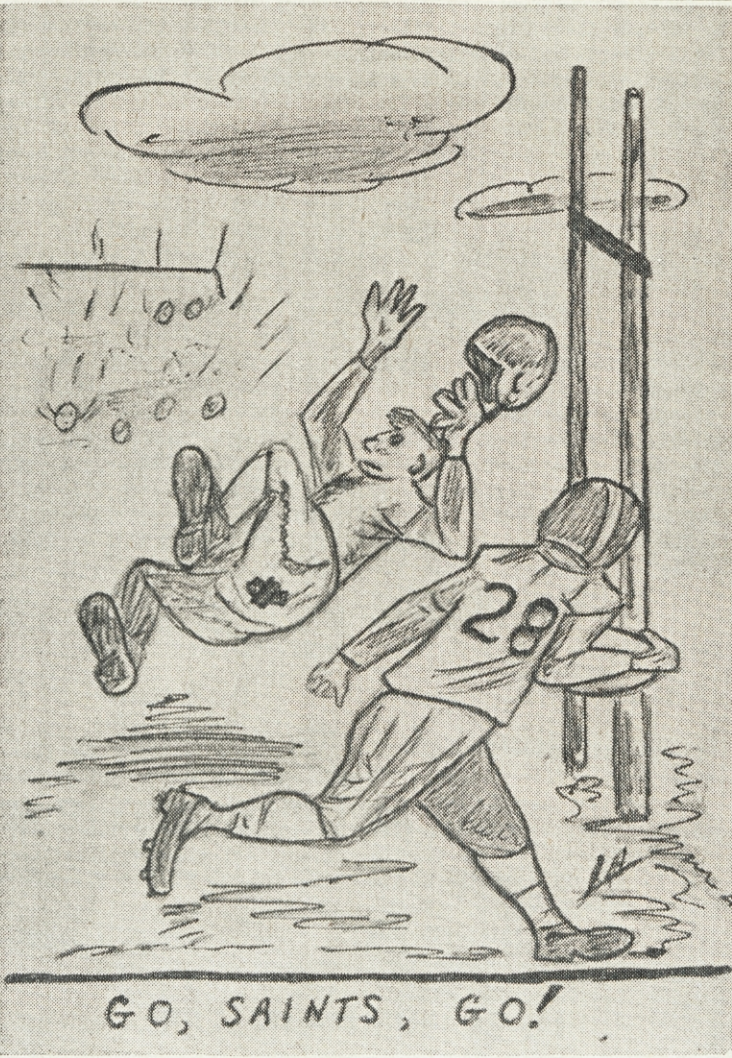
The first half provided very little excitement, but big Bob Simmons on a fine run down the middle, managed to earn the first and only T.D. for the Saints.
