In their opening game of the season St. Dunstan's bowed to a strong Royal Air Force team from Charlottetown. Using a dribbling style of play, R. A. F. controlled the ball in the first half. One minute after the opening whistle, the Airmen scored a try. Receiving the ball cleanly from a scrum on Saints' thirty-five yard line the R. A. F., raced down the field, with F/O Wall taking it over in the corner. The attempt to convert was wide. After this score the Airmen continued to press and for the next ten minutes hemmed the Saints inside their twenty-five yard line. The Red and White ranks held however and Joe Martin relieved the pressure with a long kick to centrefield. Saints then carried the play into R. A. F. territory but timely Airforce kicking prevented their scoring.

In the second half, St. Dunstan's controlled the play. Poor ball handling however and hard Airforce tackling ruined their scoring chances. R. A. F. took advantage of a Red and White defensive lapse to score their second try. A long dribble from centrefield paid off when Sgt. Davies, following up fast, pounced on a loose ball over the Saints' line.

To overcome the advantage in dribbling held by R. A. F. Saints resorted to a kicking game. Long punts by Cameron and Martin brought the play to the Airforce thirty yard line. Here St. Dunstan's was awarded a penalty kick and Jack Murray made a beautiful placement to give his team three points. The Saints kept up the pressure but could not break through the stout defence thrown up by the R. A. F. squad and the final whistle found play at centrefield.

St. Dunstan's met the R. A. F. for the second time on Oct. 16. The game was played in a steady drizzle which made good football impossible. Saints put on the pressure from the starting whistle and, on a dribble led by Willie MacDonald, moved to the Airforce fifteen yard line. The Red and White forwards kept control of the play and Captain A. J. MacAdam scored when he fell on the ball after it was kicked over the R. A. F. line by Dalziel. Jack Murray, forced to rush his kick, was short on the attempt to covert the try.

After this score the Airmen went on the offensive. Their dribbling style of play on the wet ball baffled the Saints. They capitalized on a long dribble as Atwood plunged over the line for a try. At this point Jack Murray received a leg injury and was replaced by Mike Hennessey. The Airforce boys continued the pressure and scored as Smith carried the ball over on a halfline play from the Saints twenty yard line. Not content with this lead, R. A. F. drove back into St. Dunstan's territory. Here they were awarded a penalty kick and Flt. Sgt. Kingdon dropkicked brilliantly to put his team six points in the lead. St. Dunstan's steadied after this and, adopting a dribbling game, carried the play to the Airmen for the remainder of the half.

At the start of the second half, Saints, fighting to cut down the R. A. F. lead, took the offensive. Using the wind they punted and dribbled to the Airforce five yard line. Here the Airmen tightened up and dribbled out of danger. The play, consisting mostly of dribbling and kicking, ranged up and down the field. In the final minutes St. Dunstan's sprang to life. From a lineout deep in Saints' territory MacAdam kicked the ball into the open. He outraced the Airforce fullback to the ball and, booting it over the line, fell on it directly behind the posts. Allan MacDonald booted the convert to make the score 9—8. Fans were sensing a Red and White comeback but time expired immediately after the kickoff.

St. Dunstan's Senior team scored its first victory of the season on Oct. 27, when it defeated the R. A. F. team 8—0. The game was scheduled as the opener of the newly-formed Island Rugby League. Saints were a much improved team as the forwards heeled and dribbled to perfection and the backfield passed well and ran off long gains. The R. A. F. forwards were weakened by the absence of their Captain, F/O Evans; but the Fliers' backfield was strengthened noticeably by the return of Ac. Vincer to his halfline position.

St. Dunstan's went to work from the starting kick-off. Following up under a high kick Willie MacDonald tackled the ball carrier so hard that he dropped the ball. A. J. MacAdam, Saints' tireless Captain, booted the ball over the line and outraced three Airmen to it, for a try. Jack Murray converted from a difficult angle to put Saints ahead 5—0. St. Dunstan's threatened several times during the remainder of the half. Joe Martin turned in long runs for the Saints but sharp R. A. F. tackling stopped each scoring threat.

In the second half fans witnessed the best football played on Alumni field this season. It was a contest between the Red and White running backfield and the Airforce kicking stars. Ac. Vincer got away long kicks from his halfline position to gain many yards for his team. His work was nullified however by the great broken-field running of St. Dunstan's flying quarter, Joe Martin. And it was Martin who made the final score of the game. Taking a pass from O'Neil he reversed the field and went twenty yards for a try just one minute before the end of the game.
