

FACULTY

Welcome to our College, Father Murphy.

Sullivan had returned from his studies at the Catholic University of America. *Red and White* extends him congratulations on the receiving of his Master's Degree in Philosophy. Father Sullivan has resumed his duties as Master of Studies and Professor of Philosophy.

At the departure of our beloved English Professor, D. J. Sullivan, M.A., we were not surprised. Numerous offers were being made by larger institutions. He was fitted for higher positions and we could not hope to detain him for more than three years. He has accepted a position as Professor of Philosophy at Fordham University. St. Dunstan's students envy the opportunity afforded the Fordham students of associating with this scholarly man.

As Professor of English, in the place of Professor Sullivan, we welcome Mr. George Gillespie, M.A. Professor Gillespie is also a Toronto citizen and has had considerable experience in teaching and in journalism. He is both a graduate and post-graduate of the University of Toronto. We hope that his stay with us may be a long and happy one.

Owing to a recent operation, Father Francis has been unable to continue as director of the Commerical Course. Professor J. C. Murphy is substituting for Father Francis.

Rev. F. Cass is studying Chemistry at McGill University. Father Cass was ordained at Charlottetown in '35 and spent last year doing post-graduate work at St. Francis Xavier University. He will return here when he has received his Master's Degree in Chemistry.

RETREAT AND BISHOP'S VISIT
