His Excellency also stressed the importance of developing the natural virtues, and urged their cultivation as a firm basis upon which to build the supernatural virtues.

This year the St. Dunstan's Contingent of the Canadian Officers' Training Corp will be brought up to full strength when the selection of the eight new candidates has been completed. The present C.O.T.C. programme, inagurated three years ago, provides for technical training during the scholastic year, supplemented during the summer months by practical experience.

The S. D. U. unit has an enviable record to date: one failure during the first year, and none during the second. It is a record which cannot be equalled by any Canadian University.

The success which the C.O.T.C. has enjoyed at St. Dunstan's has been due in a large part to the interest shown by the students in the scheme and its activities; and the long list of applicants each year is tangible proof that the students are aware of its advantages

Our unit of the C.O.T.C. is under the command of Major (Rev.) G. A. MacDonald. Captain J. T. Redmond is the resident staff officer.

In addition to the C.O.T.C., a contingent of the University Naval Training Divisions is operating on the campus this year. Established during the Second World War, U.N.T.D. are being continued in the various universities across Canada to provide a naval officers' training programme which will enable college students to become commissioned officers in the Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve).

Opportunity is also provided in certain branches for entry into the R.C.N. as commissioned officers for those who wish to follow the navy as a career.

This year the plan calls for the acceptance of approximately twenty five students from Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University as first year officer candidates. Of this number slightly over half will be from S. D. U. During the school year the programme consists of weekly basic training periods on Thursday evening at H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte, Charlottetown. Next summer a six week cruise will form part of the practical phase of the scheme.

Congratulations and best wishes are extended to Jack Dalziel, popular member of the senior class, who was married to Miss Celia Rooney in late August. To add a personal note—we remember Celia as our partner in crime in Father O'Hanley's Latin class of three years ago. Jack and Celia are living in Winsloe, where Celia is again teaching school.
