to point out that if their quota of the Union's resources were decreased by any substantial amount the entire physical fitness of their department might be endangered. Senator Carthy said that the spending of this department seemed to be too far out of proportion to the other various departments and he pointed out that the selfish attitude of one single department could leave a ruinous effect on the Union's economy unless the Union government could be brought to a realization of what was going on.

Senator Craig, the financial wizard of this department, took the stand in the A.A.A.'s defence. The genial Senator from the Magdalen constituency pointed out

that this rather lavish spending had been suggested by their adviser, Abud McGuiganavitch, Minister of Finance, who said that such spending was good for their department. Senator Craig said: "This spending program was designed primarily to use up the excess cash so that future subsidies of the same could be assured by the Union."

Carthy infuriated by the uncovered evidence began to direct his main charges against Rep. McInnis. Carthy took the stand and delivered the following speech: "It is my contention that this department has been ill-advised, ill-directed and ill-at-ease—to make a long story short, ill. As chairman of this committee, it is my business to bring this whole business to a conclusion, to expose the discrepancies of the department, to give our people the facts, the true facts. Our economy, the economy of the Union, must be protected; we must, as members of this government, safeguard the other small departments whose ends are more in the way of intellectual pursuit. If we are to spend so lavishly, if we are to place brawn before brain, we will bring ruin to the extra-curricular activities of this institution. It is my firm conviction that we cannot allow this one department to dominate the affairs so ruthlessly. Our investigations have proven that the designs of the members of this department are destined to undermine our entire economy. I am firmly convinced that such activity has been perpetuated by subversive agents within the department. My lieutenants, Cone, and Shine have evidence to prove that Rep. McInnis' attitude toward the welfare of our Union has taken on such a muscovite look that I do hereby brand him a subversive agent."

As the outspoken senator took his seat, the others were surprised to see Rep. McInnis feint behind the fifth amendment. This caused great alarm among those present. Another Carthy sympathizer, Capt. (honorary) Bolgeronia took the stand and he said, "I am with Carthy right or wrong." At this point Murgansky charged Carthy with - - -

Learning. The trial was that of Sleepy Reg McQuaid who has recently been arrested and brought before the Extreme Judge of Superior English Breeding Gradey by Paul Jay, (R.C.M.P. (Really Can Memorize Poetry). Sleepy has been charged with the killing of a certain Gerard Manley Poetry, whom Jay says he found lying in a rather crumpled position in the bed of the accused with nineteen and one half heavy red marks across the headline.

Recent reports from authorities of the Extreme Court reveal that a suit brought against two local editors by MacGuiganvitch has failed to materialize. The suit was one of assault (NaCl) and battery (dry-cell) on the charge that two editors of a now defunct publication allegedly disclosed facts detrimental to the plaintiff's professional status. The suit, consisting of trousers, jacket with bent elbows, and a peaked cap, was one of the most perplexing ever brought before the Extreme Court. Confusion arose at the outset because the charge, assault and battery, came under both the Sifty Chemical and Household Commodities Act, and the Storage Section of the Hydro Commissions Act. The charge was introduced anew as a libel suit to the tune of fifty-nine (59) cents plus amusement tax, but this too has fallen through as many libel suits are libel. Now there is the question of jurisdiction, for although the case is sound, it appears that the accused are boxed in and the money cannot be collected. Later reports indicate that the Reddin White Syndicate has been declared insolvent and the editors are now out of the country managing the Uncollectable Debts Department of the Ladies Loam Journal in the Italian Somammland.
