

A GOOD BUT DISAPPOINTING YEAR FOR HOCKEY SAINTS

The 1966-67 hockey season was the longest in St. Dunstan's history — 23 games in all — and put the Saints in second position in the Maritime Intercollegiate League, one point behind defending title holders St. Francis X-Men. The year started off well before Christmas with an exhibition win and two league victories, the first an 8-6 effort against Dal after trailing by four goals, and the second a 1-0 shutout against UNB Red Devils.

Over the Christmas break, the Saints participated in the Centennial Intercollegiate tournament held in Montreal sponsored by Loyola and the Montreal Canadiens. They finished the series with a 1-1 record, losing to Toronto Varsity and beating Loyola Warriors.

Back in the Maritimes on the 14th, they put on a late third period burst against St. F.X. with the score at 7-1, but didn't

have enough stamina, losing 7-5. There was little trouble with the rest of the schedule throughout January and most of February, and the Saints went on a seven game winning streak. The bubble burst in Halifax when St. Dunstan's tied

last place Dalhousie Tigers, after blowing a 4-3 lead in the dying seconds of the third to force an overtime.

Had St. Dunstan's not tied Dal, the Maritime title would have been decided in Charlottetown in the rubber match against St. F.X., since exclusive of their series, neither team would have been defeated. The big game came on February 10 and St. Dunstan's broke a 28 game winning streak of the X-Men with Alan Flood's winning goal in the third period. The Saints won the game 3-2 but X had the title wrapped up. St. Dunstan's beat Mount Allison and Moncton with relative ease, but X copped victories over UNB, St. Thomas, and Dal to win their nineteenth league title.

WINTER GAMES

The Saints participated in the first Annual Centennial Winter Games held in Quebec City, where 2000 athletes, coaches and officials gathered for a week of matches in twelve sports.

The Saints completed the week long series with a two and three record, including an 8-2 dumping over St. F.X., who to that point had a chance to win series "A". Injuries to key players early in the week made for short bench strength, and caused some important losses.

For Coach Jack Kane, who started his fifth season with the club rebuilding a new team, there are some satisfying moments in the 1966-67 schedule. The team played the best college teams in Canada, and beat some of the top clubs.

A rookie-studded lineup is easy to build with, and prospects for next years are good. However, in Glen Hughes, Vince Mulligan, and Mike Kelly, who won the league scoring race with 35 points, the fourth time in five years a St. Dunstan's player has done so, Kane has some big holes to fill in the lineup.

BASKETBALL WRAP-UP

The basketball Saints had their most successful season in recent history. In October, 20 aspiring ballplayers showed up for opening practices. Once football season was over, the squad was joined by veterans Allan Connolly, Owen Jay and Leon Berrouard.

Coach Ed Hilton had to pick ten from this bunch, and came up with a top crew consisting of Senior Allan Connolly, Juniors Eddie Lawlor and Ronnie Diamond, Sophomores Owen Jay, Mike Sullivan, Leon Berrouard, and Dennis Hodgson, and Freshmen Dan Theriault, John Keaveny and Tom Forrestall.

Theriault was the lone Freshman to crack the starting lineup, and crack it he did. He finished second in league scoring, led the team in assists, was one of the top rebounders, and electrified fans with his sharp defensive play. With three years left in this league, Danny should turn out to be one of the greatest.

Owen Jay was the second highest scorer for the Saints averaging 2.3 points less than Theriault. Owen and Danny were instrumental in the team's most potent weapon, the fast break. As Saint Mary's coach, Les Goodwin, put it, "Once he gets under those boards, no one is going to move him, and once he gets the ball he has more moves than a Turkish rattle-snake". As fourth ranking scorer in the league, Jay showed considerable improvement over his last year's production.

Although the whole starting team consisted of five guards, someone had to play forward. This task fell on the able shoulders of veterans Mike Sullivan and Ed Lawlor. Ronnie Diamond, a transfer student from

PWC, completed the trio. Lawlor amazed fans and opponents alike with his uncanny rebounding ability. Being only 5'10", Eddie should have had trouble outreaching his 6'6" opposition, but this was not the case. The biggest play that Eddie had to make all season was perhaps his clutch basket that gave the Saints a victory over X in Antigonish.

Mike Sullivan was one of the most improved players in the league this season. Ordinarily considered an offensive player, Mike surprised himself, but few others, with his steady defensive work. Although he had a mid-season slump, Mike was one of the team's top scorers with his unusually accurate long jumper.

BEST LITTLE MAN

Ronnie Diamond was the best little man in the league. At 5'7" he was considerably shorter than any other forward. However among the best executed plays of the season were performed by Ronnie as he faked, and shot around and over most of the 'giants'. Ronnie's biggest game was also against the X-Men, when he hit a personal high of 32 points in the game here. His individual foul shooting percentage of 87.5 broke the former M.I.A.A. basketball mark of 86.3 set by SDU's Mike Sullivan in the 1965-66 season.

Allan "Posty" Connolly was the lone senior on the squad. As sixth man he was in all games, and produced in most. His experience was a valuable asset, and as UNB coach, Don Nelson, attested, "I've seen you for four years Connolly and you were among the best." Posty had one of the best shots in the squad and could be counted on to come through in the clutch.

Leon Berrouard, John Keaveny, Dennis Hodgson and Tom Forrestall filled out the rest of the squad. Leon is a second year man and shows promise of things to come. His biggest assets are his right and left hand jumpers.

John is the tallest of the outfit at 6'3". Only a freshman, "Kev" could find himself in a tarring berth next year.

Dennis Hodgson and Tom Forrestall are both first year men, and lack the necessary experience in organized ball. Both have shown potential, and improvement is expected next year.

The season was both disappointing and rewarding for the Saints. They lost two very close games in Dalhousie and Mount A, but won a squeaker from former champion Acadia. The two victories over St. F.X.

were the sweetest, while an easy win in the first game of the season over Mount A started the Saints off on the right foot.

NEXT YEAR

Next year, who can tell? With a league leading team, foul shooting percentage completion of 73.6, and a third place finish of 43.7 in the field goal percentage department, additional height and more rebounds could bring a league championship to SDU in the near future.

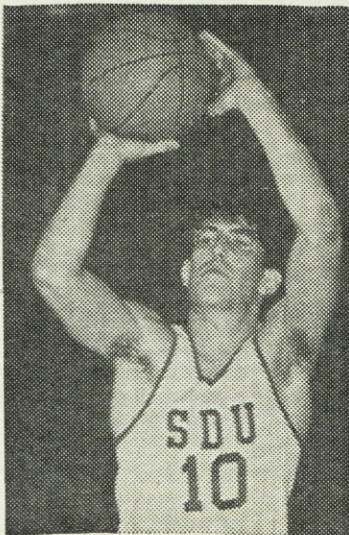
