

COLUMBIAN SOCIETY'S CONCERT

The anniversary of Washington's natal day was as usual a holiday at the College. Owing to circumstances the annual concert given under the auspices of the Columbian Society, in honor of the "Father of his Country," was postponed to Feb. 26. The entertainment was one of the best ever given in the College Hall. By departure from custom, comic sketches predominated over the musical element. The presentation of the different parts was well received by the audience; "Old Cronies" being especially appreciated. This was but to be expected, as it had, some weeks previously, made a decided "hit" before a critical audience in Kelly's Cross.

Rector to grant the remainder of the day as a conge in his honor. After granting His Lordship's request, our Rector asked Sir Charles to address the students. Our hononrable visitor, having briefly alluded to the cause of his interest in the welfare of St. Dunstan's, exhorted the boys to take advantage of the splendid opportunities which this institution offers them. He concluded by thanking the students for their kind reception.
