

ATHLETICS



By all the slang and noise heard on the campus the past week or two, one would judge the baseball season to be in full swing. At any recreation one hears such pithy sentences as:—"Batter up!" "Play Ball!" "Knock the cover off the old pill!" and such like. King, J. Keegan and C. Tingley tallied up three runs for S.D.U. Only one-half of the seventh inning was played. The Rovers succeeded in getting one more run, which brought their total to four.
