

#### Lecture

On Wednesday evening, April 4, Mr. John T. Croteau, M.A., Professor of Sociology and Economics, delivered a lecture before the student body on the Recovery Programme recently launched by President Roosevelt. In the short time at his disposal Professor Croteau briefly outlined the aims of the President in preparing such a scheme and explained its more important phases namely, the National Recovery Act, the Civic Works Association and the Civilian Conservation Corps. The broader aspects of the business outlook under the Industrial Recovery Law were discussed and, although the utopian goal was not likely to be reached, the speaker expressed the opinion that we can look forward to a general eradication of obvious bad practices in business and a return at least in part, to the prosperity once enjoyed.

After the lecture the Rector, on behalf of the students, thanked the speaker and expressed the wish that we would have the opportunity of hearing him again in the near future.

#### Visit

On Sunday, April 29, Rev. J. A. Cloran, C.SS.R., of Woodstock, Ont., favoured us with a short talk. Father Cloran, taking as his subject, "Holiness," drew our attention to the real meaning of the word which comprises two things, namely; Grace of God, and Will of God. Episodes in the life of the Blessed Virgin show that she always cooperated with these in every detail and as a result must be looked upon as an exemplar of Christian holiness. In order that we may attain this, the grace of God, which can be had by recourse to prayer, is necessary. This grace, once it has been bestowed upon us by God, is our assurance of temporal happiness and eternal salvation.

## St. Thomas' Literary and Debating Society

Dr. Murphy, Rector of St. Dunstan's, delivered a very instructive talk at the Sacred Heart Home in which he outlined the primary functions and the present activities of this institution. At the Sanatorium, Dr. P. A. Creelman, in an illustrated lecture, briefly explained the methods regarding the treatment and care of tubercular patients.
