VISIT OF APOSTOLIC DELEGATE

The College was honoured July 11th, with a very distinguished visitor in the person of His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate, Hildebrando Antoniutti. He was accompanied by Bishop Vachon of Ottawa. Most of the College professors, who were doing parish work in various parts of the Island, returned to the college for the day to take part in the reception in honor of His Excellency. At the dinner, speeches were made by the Apostolic Delegate, Bishop O'Sullivan, Bishop Vachon, and the Reverend Rector Monsignor Murphy.

Bishop Vachon, who is a noted authority on Chemistry and allied sciences, commented very favourably on

the new Science Hall.

His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan, paid his first official visit of the year to the College on Thursday, September 26th. After celebration of Mass His Excellency addressed the students, laying particular emphasis on correct attitudes towards college work.

On September 23rd, St. Dunstan's was favoured with a visit by Honorable Dr. Tadieusz Brzezinski, Polish Consul to Canada. Received by the Reverend Rector, the Consul was roundly cheered by the assembled students. He replied with a short address of appreciation, conveying the greetings of Polish youth and striking a strong note of hope and confidence in the ultimate happy outcome of the present catastrophe.

The Annual Fall Retreat for the students was held September 20th to 22nd, conducted by Reverend Robert MacDonald, C. S. S. R. An excellent Retreat preached by an excellent Retreat Master.

At a special meeting of the S. D. U. A. A. A. there were elected to fill vacancies: George McKenna, Vice-President; Hubert O'Hanley, Secretary Treasurer; and Leo Rossiter, Trackmaster. A few weeks later further vacancies were filled by electing Maurice Smith as Basketball Representative and Edouard Caron for Tennis.

The St. Dunstan's unit of the C. C. S. M. C. was reorganized October 3rd, with the election of the following officers: President, Leo Poirier; Vice-President, Joseph McLeod; Secretary, Maurice Smith, Councillor, Linus Rossiter. Reverend R. V. MacKenzie is Moderator of the unit.

During the week of October 1st, the various debating societies were reorganized. In most classes there has been marked activity.

On Tuesday, October 2nd, the annual Field Day was held. Although there was keen competition in all events, no records were broken.

Contributing to the Educational Program, Reverend Dr. O'Hanley gave a radio address over CFCY on Thursday evening, November 14th. His subject was "Development of Human Resources by Vocational Guidance and by Training in Initiative and Self-dependence".

An executive meeting of the Canadian Federation of Catholic College Students was held at Halifax on November 22nd. St. Dunstan's was represented by Reverend J. P. E. O'Hanley as Faculty Advisor, and Mr. John Trainor as student representative. Mr. Trainor is Vice-President of the Maritime Council.
