FIVE GAMES ON TAP IN MIBC

Action in the Maritime Intercollegiate Basketball Association resumes this weekend with five games on tap. This Friday St. Francis Xavier X-Men will meet Ed Hilton's SDU Saints as part of the Winter Carnival festivities, while St. Mary's journey to Mount to UNB. Saturday St. Mary's go to UNB and Dalhousie Tigers meet Allison University and Acadia goes St. Dunstan's in the Alumni Gym.

The Xaverians are a perennial power in the MIBC and this year is no exception. Coach Packy MacFarlane considers his team as good if not better than last year's squad which came within an eyelash of winning the Maritime Championship. The X-Men lost the title in a playoff series with league leading Acadia Axemen, and both these teams are again co-favorites to win the league championship.

Dalhousie could be the surprise team of the circuit this year. In their first four outings they won only one of them — but were outscored in the four game total by 21 points only—308-287. They have showed a lot of promise in their last two games, and Coach Al Yarr looks for an even bigger improvement. The Tigers competed in the Bluenose classic and although they lost both games, Yarr feels the team gained a lot of valuable experience. "Our rebounding has really improved," he said recently, "and is now the best part of our game."

Among their starting lineup, they have 6'6" Tom Beatie and 6'5" Norm Vickery, two new boys who joined the club this year.

Saints Prepare For Dal. Then X-Ward Ho Mon.

The Varsity Saints may be leading the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League, but the way they're practicing you'd think they were still looking for their first win. For the past few days the Saints have held their practices behind closed doors in the rink in preparation for the most difficult and the most important weekend of the season. Saturday afternoon St. Dunstan's will host Dalhousie Tigers, who have only one win in five starts, and then they move to Antigonish where they will play S. Francis Xavier X-Men, who beat Dal four times. Both the Dal and the X game are worth four points.

Judging from the past performances, it is difficult to rate the Dalhousie team very highly. In their four contests with St. F.X., they managed only three goals, compared to thirty-two against. However, they have in their goalie, Sieniewicz, a man who can stand a lot of shots. When X beat the Tigers last weekend, 10-0, it took 69 shots to get ten goals. A few held off a furious barrage of shots, weeks ago against Mount "A", he and Dal eeked a 5-4 win in overtime.

However, for the Saints the big game of the weekend is at Antigonish on Monday night. St. F.X. possess a very small rink which is perfectly suited to the X style of play. They proved that last night when they beat Toronto Marlboros of the OHA Junior "A" League. The Marlies are currently in second place in the OHA,

FIRST SHUTOUT

The Xaverians have scored a total of thirty-two goals in their first four games, while holding their opponents to just three markers. Richie MacPherson, who held Dal scoreless last Saturday,

recorded the first shutout of the season.

While it is true that X fared well so far this season, it holds just as true about the Saints, if not truer. In four games, they have won against different teams: Acadia 8-4 at home; Mt. "A" 10-3 at Sackville; Moncton 7-2 at Moncton; and UNB at home 5-3. The Saints' scoring has been well

spread over the three lines, with no line much stronger than any other. The defense corps has displayed real good form and it was weak only for a brief period in the UNB game. In addition the rookie goaltender, George MacNeil, a Freshman student from Summerside, P.E.I., has shown excellent poise in the last few outings, but especially in the UNB game. Stopping several key shots, George has been able to come up with the clutch moves when the going is roughest. But then again, so has the whole team.

TOUGH GOING

SAINTS LOSE TO ACADIA

From the opening faceoff it was evident that the Saints were playing for keeps. Billy MacMillan, last year's MHL scoring champion and MVP, opened the scoring after only fifty seconds and from that point on the Saints never looked back. At the end of the first period the Saints led 3-0 on another goal by MacMillan—his ninth of the season—and one by shifty Rex MacCarville.

MACNEIL STARS

Despite the five goals he allowed, John Wrigley in the UNB cage played an outstanding game as did his counterpart — George MacNeil in the Saints' net. Time and again MacNeil foiled would be Red

Devil scorers with outstanding saves while allowing few rebounds. Vince Mulligan and Derrel Pollock played their usual standout game as did superstars Bill MacMillan and Maurice Roy.

The latter part of the game saw UNB mount a strong comeback and possible threat but third period goals by Andre Gelinis and George Monaghan put the game on ice for the Saints.

It was sweet revenge for the Saints as everyone could remember only too well the outcome of last year's encounters between St. Dunstan's and the Red Devils. The victory left the Saints in contention for a Maritime Championship as they now own a record of four wins and no defeats.

This Saturday sees the Saints play host to the Dalhousie Tigers while Monday night brings with it that all important four point game at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish. Saturday's game will be aired on CFCY radio at 2:00 o'clock.
