# Budget Plan Axed

After a month of number work and an hour long Council wrangle, Finance Committee Chairman, Rich Duffy, suggested four changes to streamline SDUSU budget procedure.

Council ignored them and argued about cameras, conferences and the cost of hockey sticks for the rest of its Nov. 15 meeting.

## DUFFY RECOMMENDED:

- 1) That the Finance Committee be appointed before the end of the academic year so it would coincide with the fiscal year and be in a more knowledgeable position.
- 2) That all budgets be submitted on the first Wednesday after class begins in the fall term. This would eliminate delay in processing estimates.
- 3) That the budgets have a specific form for easy filing.
- 4) That an inventory be kept on articles which particular societies have so that useless duplication would be eliminated.

The dispute centered on the general budget in principle, as well as on the budgets of the various societies. It ranged from the general budget being a mere estimate and not a fixed figure to the question of qualifications of those present to speak on cameras.

An interesting debate on the question of individual society initiative, and the overall budget:

**LEO BRODERICK:** "If a society holds a dance and it's not in the budget you can't very well let them spend that money because we didn't approve that expenditure in their original budget."

**TREASURER BOB DONAHUE:** "But, they can come back for a supplementary grant."

**BILL MORSE:** "But it's their money, they showed the initiative to earn it and ought to be able to spend it."

Increases came for the Red and White, Yearbook, Executive and Photo budgets.

The clamor and din, first slamming and cat calls, finally ceded to allow passage of a budget of \$1040.00 with \$5000.00 remaining for renovations to the Student Union offices and other unforeseen expenses.

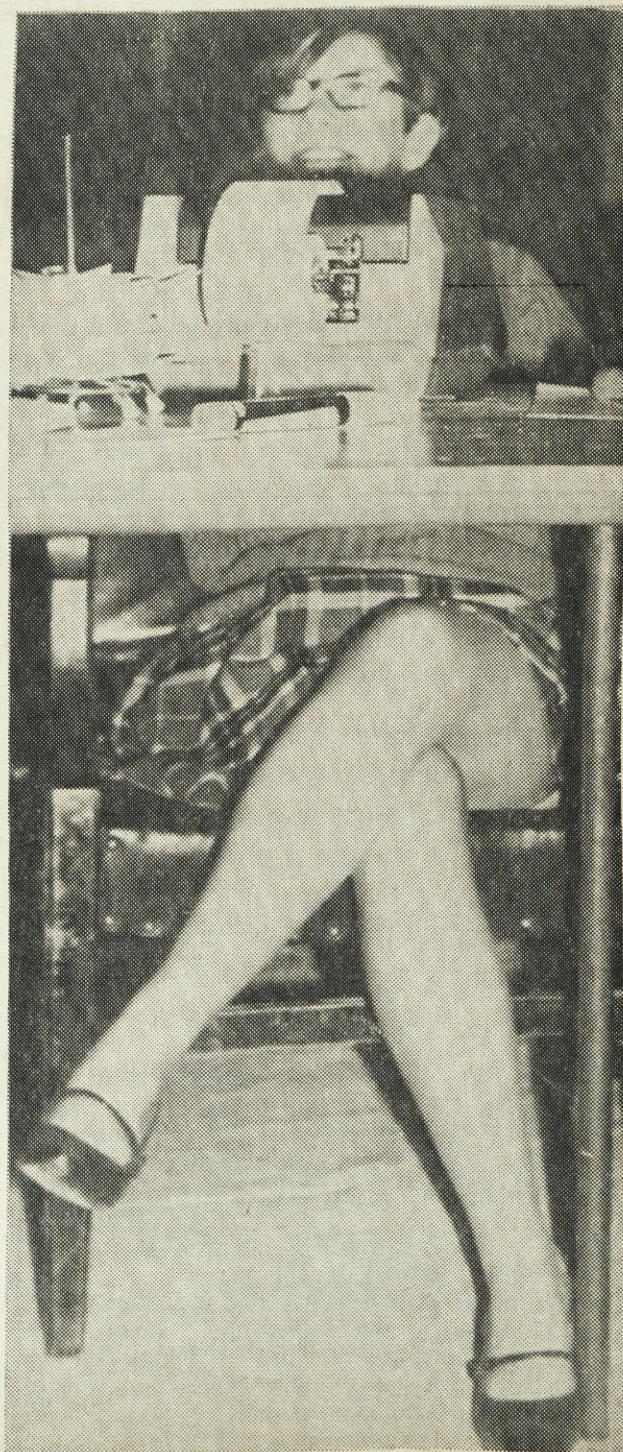
