S.D.U. BASKETBALL SQUAD LOSE TO U.N.B., DEFEAT MT. A.

Saint Dunstan's University Basketball team opened its Intercollegiate Basketball league schedule against the University of New Brunswick Red Raiders at U.N.B. on January 14. The Saints tasted defeat to the tune of 78-42. Saint Dunstan's never seemed to get rolling and trailed from the early minutes of the game.

Frank McHugh dunked 18 points for the fast-moving hometown cagers, who led 41-25 at the half. Ted Tomchuck had 13 points and Roy Miller shot 15 for U.N.B. Frank Garrity, the only player for the Saint's to hit double figures, produced 11 points.

Referees Bill Ritchie and Malcolm Early called 26 fouls on the University of New Brunswick, and 24 on St. Dunstan's. The Raiders made good on 14 out of 35 attempts at the foul line, and the Saints hit for 16 of their 45 free tosses. Ken Harvey and Clarey Lay of U.N.B. and Larry Farrell and Jack Hopper of Saint Dunstan's were fouled out for exceeding the five personal foul limits.

J. V. BASKETBALL

The Junior Varsity basketball team has once again entered the City Basketball League. Besides the Saints, the other teams are LePage's Trotters, the Junior Trotters, the Y. M. C. A., P. W. C. and the Pirates.

The Jayvee line-up is comprised of Harry Callaghan (Captain), Phillip Mullaly, Alan MacDonald, Ray MacLean, Henry Phillips, Steve Stafford, Walter Buote, Peter Grant, Clifford Rosmond and Jim Garrity. The team is under the able coaching of Father Charles MacDonald, and it has won three of four games so far.

The Jayvees commenced their season on November 30 at P. W. C. gym, where they met the Y.M.C.A. Despite the successful attempts of MacLean and MacDonald who secured 25 and 12 points respectively, the "Y" managed to take the game by a score of 70 to 65.

However, in the second game, held at the P.W.C. gym on December 3, the Saints had little difficulty over the Junior Trotters. The Jayvees had the upper hand throughout the game with the score at the end of the first half being 35-10. The top

point-getters were MacLean with 20, Callaghan with 12, and MacDonald with 11, the final score being 71-33.

The third game, and first for this term, was held at the S.D.U. gym on Jan. 14. Apparently the vacation had no ill-effects, for the Jayvees trounced the Pirates 62-38. Scoring was fairly well distributed through the ranks, but MacLean managed to hold his position as the leading point man by sinking 19 points. Stafford also shone from behind the foul line with 10 points out of a possible 13.

By far the most exciting game was the fourth one which was held at the P.W.C. gym on January 18 against the Junior Trotters. For the second time it looked as if the Saints might succumb to the driving efforts of their opponents. At the end of the first half, the Trotters were ahead 26-22. However the Saints were determined to reverse this score and during the second half the margin between the two teams slowly narrowed to one point. Both teams took on an air of urgency as the time began to run out, but the Saints steadily gained and came out on top with a score of 60-59. The leading scorer was Callaghan (19 points), who played a remarkable game, especially during the last half where it proved to be the most rewarding. Steve Stafford, who sank 11 points, procured these during the last half, the majority being made with his formidable hook shot. Most effective against the Saints were MacDougall, Cumisky, and Murphy for the Trotters.

All and all, the Jayvees seem to have a very promising team. To back up the leading scorers, there are such encouraging players as Phil Mullaly, Walter Buote, Phillips, Peter Grant, Garrity, and Rosmond who never fail to come in on a number of baskets and boost the final score.

There are eleven more games to be played by the Jayvees, and if they can continue with the good work, it is felt certain that they can capture the championship. MOUNT "A", FREDERICTON TROUNCE SAINTS 7-3, 13-2

Firing four unanswered goals in the last twenty minutes, Mt. Allison Varsity squad defeated Saint Dunstan's Varsity 7-3, in a N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate title at the S.D.U. rink on Saturday, January 14 and the University of New Brunswick's Varsity hockey team again crushed the Saints 13-2 the following Saturday evening on the Saint's home ice.

In the first game, the Saints jumped into the lead at 16:12 of the first period on a goal by Gillis from Tingley. Henderson knotted the score at 1:18 of the second period, but the Saints bounced back at the 4:15 mark to shoot ahead again. However, Mount A. fired two more counters before the Saints hit again to leave the score at 3-3 at the end of the second period.

In the third period, the Mounties swarmed all over the Red and White Squad. Frank Callaghan had twenty shots hurled his way, while the Saints had only one on Bryson, the Mount Allison goal-keeper. Throughout the whole game, Callaghan had 48 shots to handle and made several great saves.
