Saint Dunstan's To Honor Three

Professor Joseph Henri Blanchard, Charlottetown; Hon. Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan, Charlottetown; and Dr. Colin B. MacKay, president of the University of New Brunswick will receive Doctor of Law Degrees at the May 11th commencement exercises at St. Dunstan's University, it was announced by SDU president, Rt. Rev. G. A. MacDonald.

PROF. BLANCHARD

Professor Blanchard was born at Oyster Bed Bridge, P. E. I., in 1881. He attended Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University, graduating from SDU with the Laval Bachelor of Arts degree in 1911.

During the time he was studying for his degree, Professor Blanchard was also teaching at both Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's. He was appointed to the permanent staff at PWC in 1910 and remained there until his retirement in July, 1948.

Professor Blanchard taught many subjects at PWC at the high school level in his early years and at the university level during his last 15 years. He also held the position of vice-principal of Prince of Wales College from 1937 to 1948.

A noted scholar, Professor Blanchard continued his studies at the Sorbonne in Paris in 1928, taking languages, history and the arts, and being awarded a certificate from that noted institution. About the same time he was awarded his Master of Arts degree from Laval.

He has received two citations and medals from the French Academy in Paris, honorary doctor-

ate degrees from Laval and St. Joseph's, and has merited several decorations from French and Academic Orders.

Professor Blanchard is the author of several publications the latest being "The Acadians of Prince Edward Island, 1720-1964" which appeared last year. He has also written numerous articles and reviews.

He is married to the former Ursula Gallant and the couple celebrated their fiftieth anniversary in 1962. They have eight children, three of whom are deceased.

MR. JUSTICE MacGUIGAN

Mr. Justice MacGuigan was born in Hope River, P. E. I., in 1894. He graduated from St. Dunstan's University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1914.

He read law with the firm of MacKinnon and McNeill and was called to the Bar of P.E.I. in 1918. He was appointed a King's Counsel in 1930.

A member of the P.E.I. Legislature for many years, Judge MacGuigan was first elected in the Liberal interest for 3rd Queens in 1935.

The same year he was appointed minister of education and public health. He was re-elected in 1939 and 1943 and appointed attorney-general on April 8, 1943.

He has been a justice of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island since 1944, and was named Master of the Rolls in the same year.

Judge MacGuigan is married to the former Agnes Trainor. They have two children.

DR. MacKAY

Dr. MacKay was born in Rothesay, N. B., in 1920. When he was appointed president of the University of New Brunswick at the age of 33, he became the youngest Canadian university president in history.

Educated at Rothesay Collegiate School, UNB, Harvard Univer-

sity and the University of British Columbia, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree at UNB in 1942.

After serving as an officer in the Royal Canadian Navy during World War Two, Dr. MacKay returned to his studies and graduated from UBC with the degree of LL.B. in 1949.

Prior to his appointment as UNB president, he was lecturer at UNB's faculty of law in Saint John and practiced law as a partner in the firm of Ritchie, McKelvey and MacKay in the same city.

In 1954, Mount Allison University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Civil Law (DCL). He also received honorary Doctor of Law degrees from UNB in 1955, from Laval in 1957, and from Colby College in Maine in 1964.

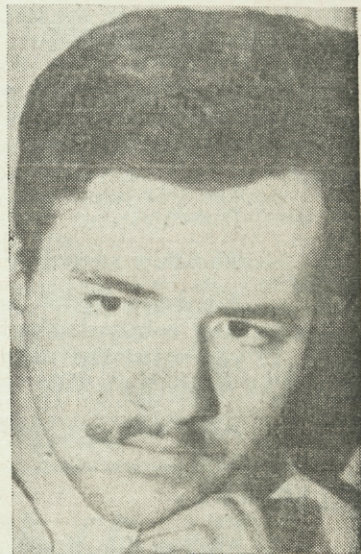

OUR NEW EDITOR

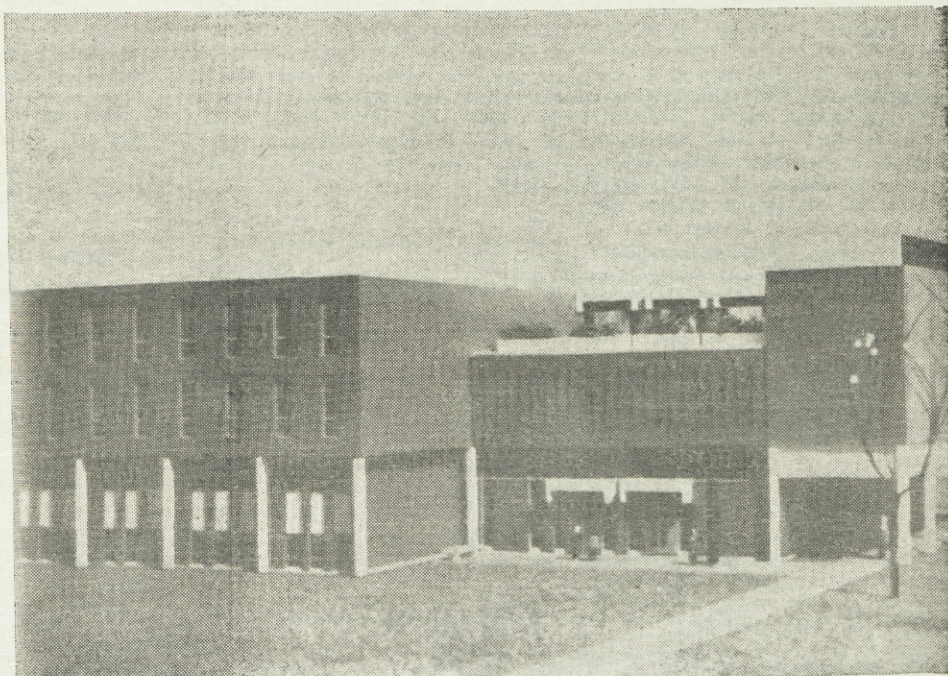


LARRY DonELYSYN
