

NEW FROM CBC

CBC Publications has just released information on some of its most recent published editions.

The first of these is QUEBEC: YEAR EIGHT, which contains the proceedings of the Glendon College Forum, held at Glendon College, York University, Toronto, November 24-26, 1967. The speakers, Robert Cliche, Michael Oliver, Heward Grafftey, Eric Kierans, Jean-Luc Pepin, Rene Levesque, F. R. Scott,

Gilles Gregoire, Fernand Ouellet, Louis Balthazar, Claude Ryan, and Ramsay Cook, focused on events within Quebec and between Quebec and the rest of Canada since the death of Premier Maurice Duplessis in 1959.

The question of science's moral responsibility in the light of pressing social issues of our times was debated on CBC Television by specialists from Canada, Britain, and the United States. The eight

panel sessions have been transcribed to form the text of the publication SCIENCE AND CONSCIENCE — A Television Symposium Among the subjects dealt with are space exploration, nuclear weaponry, mercy killings, and race relations. The panelists included Malcolm Muggeridge Patrick Watson was the moderator.

A PLACE FOR EVERYTHING is a "nature book with a difference". It deals with various ecological regions of Canada (land Arctic, mountain areas, forests, plains, sea-shores, lakes, rivers) and their vegetation and creatures, including Man. Its author is the Director of the Canadian Wildlife Service. It contains 112 pages (8½ x 11") with 287 photographs, including nine full-color plates.
