WHITHER GO THE NEW
BLUENOSE CONFERENCE?

THE SUCCESS OR FAILURE of any sport is measured in terms of its results at the boxoffice. Whether the sport be on the professional or amateur, senior or intercollegiate level, the criterion remains the same.

Thus when a visitor makes a visit to any one of the football games in the Maritimes, he must be awestruck with the performance. Only a horror show approaches it for agony. The picture of imbalance displayed in the Bluenose Conference this year has detracted from the game's popularity to a shocking proportion, and even jeopardizes any success the league thought it might attain.

OFF TO A BAD START

There is no point in stressing the problem here in the Maritimes. Whether you call it the Bluenose Conference, the A.F.C., or whatever, the game here has been and is dominated by one or at best two teams. And without a reasonable semblance of balance, a league in any sport is doomed to ultimate failure. The Bluenose Conference is off to a bad start.

But where does the solution lie? There is much to be said for the argument that the weaker teams should build up to the level of the stronger clubs. However this is a long and costly process, and hardly solves the present dilemma. Does the answer lie in establishing divisions within the Conference itself, with provision for promotion and relegation annually.

Certainly this is a more attractive proposition which deserves further study. The league executive could set up rules for classification among the university teams, and make the schedule on that basis. Granted, this is done to a degree, but not on a satisfactory basis.

CUSTOMER WANTS SATISFACTION

Why not even cross Conference lines; that is, regularly scheduled games between A.F.C. clubs and those of the Bluenose Conference of the same calibre.

Naturally there will be jockeying for positions before anything can be done. Past experience is evidence enough for that. The stronger clubs will build up a case for the status quo. But failure to find a solution might mean the end of Canadian football as a spectator sport in this area.

No longer can the behemoths of the league be allowed to trample over the opposition without a whimper of discontent. The novelty of the game has worn off; Canadian football must remold itself to meet the demands of the paying customer if it is to survive.

The old stereotyped answer that people get tired of watching the same clubs playing each other more than once a year is not valid.

DAL HERE IN OPENER

FIRST BIG TEST COMES SATURDAY

Eight months have brought a lot of changes and new faces to St. Dunstan's, and no where is this more true than on the SDU Varsity Hockey team, defending champions of the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League.

Gone are six forwards, two defensemen, and two goalies. What remains forms the broad nucleus of a completely new edition of the SDU Saints.

Coach Jack Kane, beginning his fourth year as hockey mentor at St. Dunstan's, faces what surely is his most difficult season in the MIHL. With such heavy losses from last year's team, he has had to completely rebuild the team around three forwards: Gordie Whitlock, Maurice Roy and Mike Kelly. To these three Kane has added Rick O'Donnell, a hard skating centerman from St. Catherine's, Ontario; Dick Flynn and Dave O'Brien, two wingers who have seen Varsity service before; and newcomers Ron Giggy and Blaine Jelly both graduates of the SDU High School.

THREE BACK

On defense the Saints have three players back, all seasoned veterans to the MIHL style of play. Vince Mulligan, team captain, with four years of experience in intercollegiate hockey and two of semi-pro, is the king pin of the Saints corps. Glen Hughes is no stranger to Island fans, having played two years with St. Dunstan's and three with Montague High.

He'll be paired with hard-hitting Arthur LeClair, a 195 pound product from Shawinigan, Quebec.

The only newcomer to the defense is Doug Murnaghan, another graduate from the High School. Murnaghan, who has shown up well in the two exhibition games against PWC, will play along side Vince Mulligan.

MORE EXPERIENCE

Although a rookie to Intercollegiate hockey, Carl McQuaid of Charlottetown is no stranger to that calibre of play. A member of the Maritime Junior Champions when he was 14, Carl has more experience now than most goalies several

years older than him. He played with Birchwood and St. Dunstan's High Schools and three years with the Charlottetown Legionnaires. In case of injury, the Saints have another strong goalie in Frank McNally of Tracadie, P.E.I.

At least before Christmas, it would seem likely that Coach Kane will go with just two forward lines, four defensemen, and the two goalies. He may find room for some additions, especially after two students recover from football injuries.

STARTED LATE

Kane said that the team is ready for the Dal game tomorrow, with all the players in fine physical shape for the

season opener. "We started practices later than we had originally expected, but the team has shaped up pretty well. Our two exhibition games gave the players a chance to get used to playing with each other, and also provided me with a chance to see our relative strengths and weaknesses."

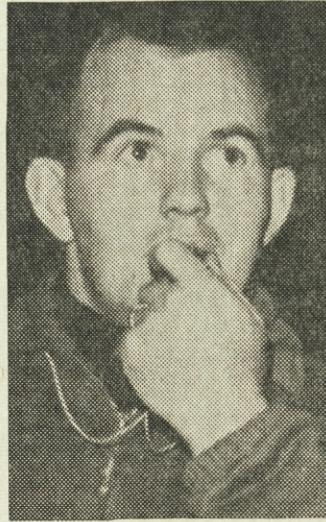
Asked how he compared this year's club to last year, he said that no team could lose players like the MacMillans, Andre Gelinas, and Rex MacCarville, and the rest without feeling the pinch. "But we're a little stronger in goal, about the same defense, and the new players have showed they can score. I don't like to make predictions; I just know that we will be out to win."

Dalhousie Tigers, according to scouting and press reports, have improved over last year considerably. Already this year they have met the NHL Old-Timers and the Eastern American Olympic team, so they should be in good shape.

Saturday's game will start at 2 o'clock sharp.
