MacDougall Elected President

Philip MacDougall is the newly elected Students' Union President. Capturing 60.7% of the 577 votes cast in Wednesday's election, he defeated his only rival, Paul Connolly, by a comfortable majority.

Mr. MacDougall will head a relatively inexperienced executive, three members of which were unopposed in Wednesday's election.

Tom Greene, a Sophomore commerce student from Emerald, P.E.I., is the new vice-president. Bob Donahoe is the treasurer. Mr. Donahoe is a Junior commerce student from Montreal. Junior arts student Mary MacInnis will officiate as Students' Union secretary.

Both presidential candidates campaigned on similar platforms, promising plans for the erection of a new Students' Union building, improved co-ordination of students and administrative activities, and increased rapport between students of the two Island universities.

Mr. MacDougall's main platform included promises of a non-profit winter carnival, a 3-

vice-president of the Students' Union this year; Chairman of the Student Discipline Committee; and delegate to several university student conferences.

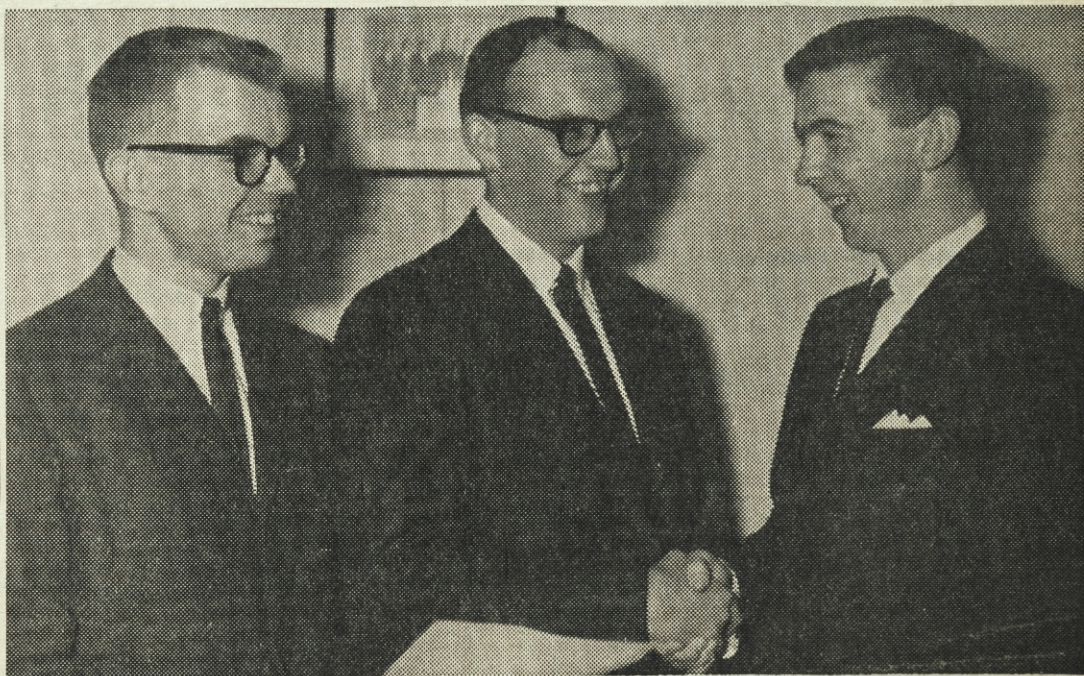
PUBLIC FORUM

One of the features of the campaign was a public forum held in the Duffy Science Centre amphitheatre. Both candidates addressed the students, after which a thirty minute question period was held. Neither candidate dominated the forum, and attendance was less than 10% of the student population eligible to vote.

FINAL RESULTS

Final results of the balloting showed Mr. MacDougall with 350 votes for 60.7% of the popular vote; Mr. Connolly with 216 votes for 37.5%; 10 rejected ballots, or 1.7% of the 577 votes cast. The 80.1% turnout in Wednesday's election represented one of the heaviest in recent Students' Union history.

The new executive will take office officially March 22.

Debaters Capture Atlantic Title; McMillan & Macdonald Off To Finals

The St. Dunstan's University Debating Society has won its second consecutive Atlantic Intercollegiate Debating Championship. The win this year is the university's tenth Atlantic title.

The Debating Society, as Atlantic champions, will represent the Atlantic Provinces at the National Finals in Calgary next week. St. Dunstan's will compete against fifteen universities from across Canada, including four others from the Maritimes. Tom McMillan and Philip Macdonald will represent St. Dunstan's.

Mr. McMillan is a senior art student majoring in history. The son of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. McMillan of Charlottetown, this is the third year he has debated intercollegiately for St. Dunstan's. In 1965, as a freshman

student majoring in history. He is the son of Mrs. and Mrs. Joseph Macdonald of Kensington, P.E.I.

Mr. Macdonald has been three times president of the campus Conservative Club, is president of the Senior Class, has been an active member of the Students' Union Finance Committee, and distinguished himself as a very capable opposition leader in the St. Dunstan's University model parliament last year sponsored by the Liberal and Conservative clubs. In his three year debating experience, Mr. Macdonald has won all his debates unanimously.

UNANIMOUS WIN

The Atlantic championship was guaranteed by a unanimous

win against Mt. St. Bernard Tuesday night before a capacity crowd in the Duffy Science Centre. Philip Macdonald and Wayne MacKinnon defeated Mt. St. Bernard by a unanimous decision that "the academic freedom of the university is threatened today."

Earlier this year, SDU debaters Charley McMillan and Errol Sharpe won a unanimous decision at St. Dunstan's against the Canadian Coast Guard College from Sydney. They upheld the negative of the resolution that "the Canadian armed forces should be abolished."

Ellen MacDonald, the only female member of the debating team, won with Tom McMillan a unanimous decision by default against Mt. St. Vincent College from Antigonish.

The National Finals in Calgary will be held March 8-11 as part of the University of Calgary's Second Century Week activities. Each team shall debate at least three rounds before elimination and final rounds for the MacDonald-Laurier Cup. Awards will also be presented to semi-final and individual speakers.

Resolutions to be debated include topics of pressing national interest during Canada's second century.

Mr. McMillan and Mr. Macdonald will leave Charlottetown for Calgary Tuesday.

FATHER BOLGER

The man who perhaps deserves more credit than anyone else for the university's debating successes this year is debating society moderator F. W. P. Bolger. Father Bolger has been debating coach at St. Dunstan's since the retirement of Rev. Fred Cass in 1961. Since becoming moderator, the Society has won the Atlantic Intercollegiate championship every year except once, in 1965.

LATE NEWS BULLETIN

Philip MacDougall, Gene Murphy, and Tom Greene will represent St. Dunstan's at Second Century Week in Calgary next week, it was announced this morning by Students' Union President Charley McMillan. The Second Century Week is a centennial project of the University of Calgary, and will feature a six-day conference and competition of Canadian university students in athletics, academic and public affairs, and the arts.

The three St. Dunstan's students will participate in a seminar.

Leaving by air Sunday, March 5, they will arrive home March 11.

Wednesday evening, a capacity crowd packed the Confederation Theatre for the first major production of the young SDU Music Department — a 1967 Centennial Revue.
