Irving Oil Pleased With Radio Coverage

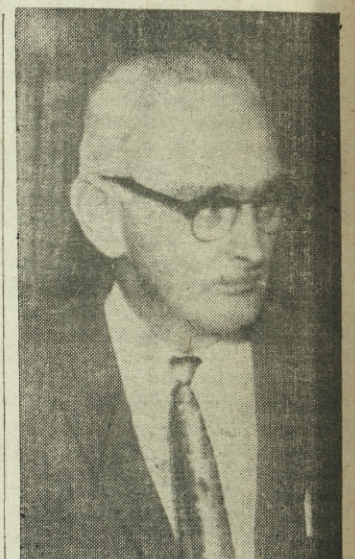
Mr. Bill Connolly, manager of the Charlottetown Branch of Irving Oil Co. Ltd., informed the Red and White recently that the Irving Oil broadcasts of the Canadian finals in Winnipeg exceeded all expectations and was a huge success in every way.

The broadcast, made possible through the cooperation of Radio Station CFCY and Irving Oil, was a first for radio in the Island and probably in the Maritimes in that it was the first time a sports event was carried over CFCY so far away directly through its own channels, rather than affiliated networks.

The program was first suggested by Ivan Doherty of the Irving Oil Co., and when head office okayed the project, Paul Williams and Loman MacAulay at CFCY set the machinery in motion.

A temporary broadcast booth was erected in the University of Manitoba rink for the first game, and facilities were provided for the second at the huge Winnipeg arena. Advertisements were prepared in St. John, and in-between-period interviews were taped before departure from Charlottetown.

Preparations were hampered slightly by the fact that the draw was not known until the day before game time, a trouble spot since the Canadian finals might interfere with CBC programming or the NHL game on Saturday.
