In early March the S. D. U. unit of the C.F.C.C.S. sponsored a dance in the Holy Name Hall, the proceeds being in aid of student relief in Europe. A very considerable sum was raised for furtherance of a worthy cause.

During their Easter holidays students collected clothing for the children of Europe. The Jesuit Fathers in Toronto are forwarding this clothing to the Polish people living in the British Zone of Germany.

The election of officers to the Students' Union took place on April 12. Those offering for election were: for President, John S. MacDonald and Frank MacKinnon; Vice-President Wilfred Driscoll and Lorne MacDonald; Secretary-treasurer Lorne Trainor, Charles Kelly, William Ledwell, and Russell Arbing. The successful candidates were John S. MacDonald, Wilfred Driscoll and Russell Arbing. The contest for secretary-treasurer was particularly close, a second ballotting being required before election finally took place.

Rev. Henri Grenier Ph.D., S.T.D., J.C.D., the author of the textbooks in Philosophy used at St. Dunstan's, was a recent visitor to the College. Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley, Ph.D., Professor of Latin of St. Dunstan's is translating Rev. Dr. Grenier's principal work, Cursus Philosophiae in three volumes. The translation of two of the volumes has already gone to press, and Father O'Hanley expects to have the third ready early in the summer.

Jim Morris and Preston Hammill, President and Secretary respectively of the St. Dunstan's A.A.A. attended the annual meeting of the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union held in Sackville on April 5. It was decided not to adopt Canadian football, and the ruling was enacted that no college student may participate in any sport for any organization other than his own college and still be eligible for intercollegiate competition.

Rev. Anthony Henry, O.S.A., of the Augustinian Monastery, Tracadie, N. S. visited the college lately. He gave the students a very interesting talk on the work of the Augustinian Order.

On March 6, the Glee Club, presided over by Michael Kelly, entertained students and faculty with a variety show. Included in the programme were songs by the choral group, specialties by the co-eds and by Ralph Bernard, Jim Saunders, Derril McGuigan, Cody Myers, and duets by Alice McCloskey and Ralph Bernard, also by Lorne MacDonald and Jim Trainor.

The Glee Club presented their variety show at the Sanatorium on April 11. This was the same show as was previously presented at the College and it received an equally warm welcome.

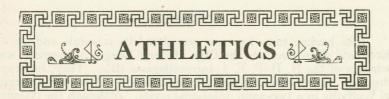
