Two conferences have been held in trying to decide which teams should comprise the new Atlantic Football Conference League which will be put into effect this coming September. At the first conference it was decided that an all collegiate league would be put into effect. The members would be St. Dunstan's, Mt. A., U.N.B. and Acadia. Dalhousie did not care to join as they felt the problem of eligibility for their team members would affect their strength. The graduates of other colleges attending Dalhousie would not be allowed to participate so they would not join.

St. Mary's also refused to become a member of this league due to academic qualifications of the players which would be necessary and they thought that it would be economically unsound also. Since St. Mary's plays two Navy teams they would have to drop them from their schedule and thus travel to greater lengths to play the member teams. This would cost them quite a bit so they claim. St. F.X. flatly refused to join the proposed league because they felt as though they must keep the "A" Conference together. It could be too that they enjoy the prestige which accompanies the winning of the Purdy Cup year after yaer.

The second conference was held and the M.I.A.U. members refused to accept the league which was derived from the first conference. Instead, it appears now that everyone with the exception of U.N.B. will be in the same league. We, St. Dunstan's, will apply for re-admission into the A.F.C. "A" section which will be comprised of St. F.X., St. Mary's Dalhousie, Mt. A., Shearwater, Stadacona, and possibly others.

The schedule will most likely be drawn up on a conference type basis, that is, we will not be playing every team in the league. This is the latest development but one cannot be sure as to the final word before kick-off date.

This coming season should produce a brand of football to the S.D.U. Field which has been unwitnessed before. This will be due to the formation of the new Intercollegiate League.
