

# ATHLETICS

The hockey team, under the capable guidance of Coach A. J. MacAdam, is entered into two leagues this year. It is a member of a four team City League which includes two teams from Charlottetown and one from Montague. Also it is battling it out with St. Thomas, Mt. Allison and the University of New Brunswick for top honors in the N.B.-P.E.I. Intercollegiate ranks.

In basketball, the Saints led by Coach Gus Dorais are trying to retain the N.B.-P.E.I. crown which they have held for the past two years. The team has also set its sights on the Intermediate title. There is also active in basketball circles a Second Team, coached by Jack Reardon, which is entered in a City League.
