## Jr. Saints Capture N.B. P. E. I. Junior Ch'ship

Displaying real power, S.D.U. Jayvees raced to the N.B.-P.E.I. Junior Football conference title with a record of three wins and one defeat. The loss came in the opener at the hands of the Welshmen, but the Saints then beat Mount Allison twice and clinched the title by trouncing P.W.C., 56-0 on Nov. 14.

In the second game against Mt. Allison, the Saints coasted to an impressive 33-7 victory. A win for the Mounties would have given them the title and it did not take them long to jump into a 7-0 lead with Purdy springing off-tackle. However the TD seemed to fire the Saints and before the half, Jim Pelrine had six of the seven points back with a 10-yard end run.

The third quarter produced an added six points for the Saints but it took them till the fourth quarter to make shambles of the Mount Allison team, when the local team hit for three TD's.

End Dick Tingley started things rolling with a 45 yard pass and run scoring play. Fullback Bob Simmons passed to Joe Murphy for the convert. Minutes later, Mike O'Brien raced 40 yards for another TD and Simmons converted by passing to Roberts. Graham Conrad closed the scoring of majors when he took a five yard pass from Pelrine and then raced 35 yards to paydirt. O'Brien converted.

Saints accumulated a total of 32 first downs as compared to twenty for the visitors. The losers tried 11 passes and completed 5 as compared with 20 to 9 record for the victors. The Mounties intercepted two, the Saints one. Vernon MacDonald starred as pass receiver, holding on to three tosses. Simmons and O'Brien starred in the ground offense.

### SAINTS DISPLAY POWER

With the stage thus set for the last contest, the Saints lost no time in displaying great power and early in the first

quarter, Alan Brady, playing a stand-out game at halfback, started the slaughter with a 20 yard run on a hand-off from quarterback Jim Pelrine. Mike O'Brien converted and the score stood at 7-0. The fired up Saints were back again five minutes later with Graham Conrad plunging over the line from two yards out. Within minutes, Mike O'Brien galloped 35 yards for the third TD bringing the score to 19-0 for the first quarter. By half time, a pass to Tingley from Pelrine and a plunge up the middle by Simmons brought the score to 31-0.

The second half produced four more majors. Play was just beginning when O'Brien carried over forty yards on a great run for his second TD of the day. Jim Pelrine got his first on a quarterback sneak a few plays later, and Simmons converted on a pass to Dick Tingley. The Saints hit for two more in the fourth with Simmons getting the first and Tingley catching a Pelrine pass for the second.

Halfbacks Mike O'Brien and Alan Brady pulled off some great runs during the afternoon's proceedings. Vernon MacDonald caught several long passes as Pelrine went 5 completions for 6 attempts in the passing department. Two of these passes were for TD's. The Saint defence played a nearly perfect game, allowing only four first downs during the course of the day. Very seldom did they permit the Welshmen to penetrate Saint territory, and never were the P.W.C. squad permitted to mount any dangerous offensive.

The Saints ended the season in first place with a 3 win-1 loss record. Mount Allison took second position with a 2-2 record and P.W.C. finished last with a 1-3 record. Saints scored 121 points for with 30 against. Mount Allison accumulated 114 for with 80 against, and P.W.C. had 25 for and 150 against.

### SAINTS GUESTS AS TOUCHDOWN CLUB FORMED

A number of local sportsmen have formed a group in order to assist in the development of Canadian football in the province and will be known as the "touchdown club".

The club was formally initiated November 19 by a dinner given at the Charlottetown Hotel in honor of the victorious SDU varsity team. Mike Campbell, acting as MC, introduced the members at the head table who later rose to speak briefly. To set the wheel in motion Joe Mahar outlined the contrasts between the old game of rugby and the new one. Coach Hilton followed Mr. Mahar by thanking the club and proceeded to introduce the team members. Hon. Angus MacRae and Rev. George MacDonald spoke on behalf of the provincial government and SDU respectively and were followed by Inspector McNeil of the RCMP who recalled some humorous events of his football days. Mr. Alex Matheson and Dr. J. A. MacMillan continued the proceedings with the former bringing back memories of the days of English rugby and the latter emphasizing the value of good coaching and discipline. Father F. Ledwell, coach of the champion JV's completed the informal talks by stressing the importance of his team as a source for future Varsity teams. Others present at the head table included Mr. A. J. MacAdam and Dr. J. L. F. Burge.

The evening was climaxed by the presentation of trophies to Len Ellis, chosen as best halfback, to Don DesRoches as best linesman and Dan Driscoll for being the most valuable player.

# VARSITY

Saint Dunstan's Varsity Football Team, under the capable coaching of Mr. Ed. Hilton, won the Intermediate "B" Conference title on November 6, edging out Shearwater Furies. Both teams had a three win-one loss record, but the Saints were crowned champions on the basis of a 30 point scoring spread over the Furies. Going into the final game against Saint FX squad with a 3-0 record and a 40 point spread over the Furies, the Saints hit hard going, bowing to the Xaviers 18-8, but they fought valiantly and protected their all-important point lead.

At Antigonish, the pin-point passing of quarterback Bill Giguere and the running of halfback Neville Hicks, who scored all Xavier points, combined to defeat the Saints 18-8. The Junior X-men led off the scoring with Neville Hicks completing a 40 yard pass and run play. The score remained 6-0 when they failed to convert. Then with the Saints in possession, Gillis and Ellis ran the ball up field, where Len

"Pigmy" Ellis tied the game on a reverse. The score stood at 7-6 when Frank Garrity kicked the convert. For the remainder of the quarter, the X-men were kept in place through the great defence playing of the Saints, sparked by the efforts of Don DesRoches.

At the beginning of the second quarter, the Saints added to their lead with Todd kicking on a third down deep into the "X" end zone. The Antigonish boys were trapped for safety touch, bringing the score to 8-6. Soon after, the X-men went ahead again with Hicks scoring his second TD with a fine end run to boost the score to 12-8. The convert attempt failed. The Saints had two fine chances to score in the closing moments of the first half, being within ten yards on one occasion, and two yards on another, but for some reason they lacked their usual final spark to push over that all-important line.

The Saints opened strong in the third quarter, showing their real selves by driving all the way to within two yards of a TD, but again they failed to push over that line. On regaining possession they repeated the performance with the same result. The X-men then put on a drive, piling up first downs one after another, but were stopped short on the rising of the Saint defense. This brought an end to the scoreless third quarter.

At the start of the fourth quarter, with St. FX in possession, Hicks again smashed 25 yards off tackle for his third TD, scoring all points for the X-men. The convert attempt failed. With about eight minutes remaining in the game, Jack Hopper was injured, leaving the quartering to Dan Driscoll. Driscoll turned in a fine performance considering the situation, which was made even bleaker due to the fact that star halfback, Jim

Bentham, was absent due to an eye injury. When the final whistle blew, the score read 18-8 St. FX.

### SAINTS PROVE CHAMPIONS

The Shearwater Furies were so anxious to get a rematch with St. Dunstan's they even offered to pay part of the expenses for the game. However, the idea of the game, to prove to themselves and to the rest of the league that they should be the rightful champs of the "B" section of the Maritime Football Conference, backfired when the Saints soundly whipped the Furies 37-6 at Dartmouth ball park on Nov. 11. This wiped out any vestige of doubt as to the superiority of the "Saints."

Gordon Dooley led the S.D.U. attack with a pair of touchdowns. Singles went to quarterback Jack Hopper, and halfbacks Len Ellis and Danny Driscoll. Frank Garrity, showing amazing form, booted four converts and added a single field goal for seven points to round out the scoring. Sound defence on the part of the Saints kept the Furies from mounting any serious threat to their game.

In regular season play, Saints record for the year is three wins-one loss, with 122 points for and 38 against. Leading scorers were Len Ellis, Dan Driscoll and Jim Bentham, with a number of other players picking up the remaining points.

The Saints worked hard for their title and they well deserve it. It did not come easy but required many long hours of hard-hitting practice to produce the winning combination. The same is true of their counterparts, the Jayvees. The Red and White staff wish to take this opportunity to extend sincere congratulations to both clubs and their coaches for their fine efforts.
