

WAGES OF SIN

On November 1, 1967, the Student Discipline Committee established the following fines which apply to all S.D.U. students.

- 1. Ten dollar fine for possession of liquor on campus.
- A minimum of a fifteen dollar fine for being intoxicated and creating a disturbance on campus.
- For damage to property costs plus twenty-five dollar fine for damages less than forty-five dollars. For damages exceeding forty-five dollars the fine is twenty-five dollars plus one third of the cost of damages.
- Other breaches of discipline differing from those mentioned will be handled as the Student Discipline Committee sees fit.
