#### HONORED GUESTS.

On Nov. 3rd. the students of St Dunstan's were honored by a visit from five distinguished churchmen, namely: Bishop O'Leary of Charlottetown, Bishop Morrison of Antigonish, Bishop McNally of Calgary, Rev. A P McLellan of St Andrew's Parish and Rev. J. J. McDonald of Kinkora. The reverend gentlemen, all of whom are old and true friends of the institution, seemed greatly pleased with the general aspect of things about the college, and, after dinner, rose, in turn, to give expression to the sympathetic interest which they had in the students.

Bishop O'Leary congratulated them on their opportunities. He assured them that all that was necessary for their success, material as well as spiritual, was honest work and self-sacrifice, and pointed to the success of Bishop Morrison as an example of what may be

attained by a St. Dunstan's College student. Bishop Morrison, then made a few remarks in which he emphasized the necessity of honesty, uprightness and especially temperance in all affairs. For, he said: "The time has come when only the strictly sober man can

be trusted in responsible positions."

Bishop McNally, on rising, explained the purpose of his visit to St Dunstan's College. He stated that his concern for souls had brought him from the far West where so many christians are languishing for God's Grace. He hoped that, from the student body, he would find some who would be willing to devote their labors to the noble work of ministering to the spiritual needs of these people.

Speeches by Rev. J. J. McDonald and A P. Mc-Lellan followed, the latter closing his remarks by effectually interceding on behalf of the students for a

holiday.

On the afternoon of Nov. 23rd, a most interesting game of football was played between our Senior team and a team composed of old stars and graduates of St. Dunstan's College.

The game, in itself, was a most strenuous trial of physical strength, agility, and manly endurance, and ended in a victory for the St. Dunstan's team,

After the game the members of both teams assembled within the college walls, and there, they who had striven as adversaries upon the field were soon engaged in an equally interesting contest at the banquet table.

At the close of a hearty meal, the players retired to the library where they participated in a delightful smoker, at which many of the individual members of the teams took occasion to express themselves upon the day's game, and upon football in general.

Most interesting speeches were delivered by the Rev. Rector, the Rev. Moderator and Mr. C. McCarthy, all of whom seemed to delight in recalling the glory won and feats performed by players of former days. The Rector's remarks were especially enjoyable as he related the history of football in St. Dunstan's College, beginning with its lamentable decline in 1898,

and ending in the discription of scenes which accompanied the memorable victories at Halifax and Victoria Park in 1905.

Postmaster General—Hon. A. Mullally.

The session of Mock Parliament will begin immediately after the Christmas holidays, when it is believed, judging from the natural pugnacity of many of the members, a stormy and interesting debate will take place.

(a) Regimental Number

(b) Rank

(c) Name

(d) Squadron, Battery or Company

(e) Battalion, Regiment, (or other unit) Staff appointment or Department

(f) Canadian Contingent

(g) British Expeditionary Force

(h) Army Post Office, London, England . . . .

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, divisions, is strictly forbidden, and causes delay.
