"You speak as one who fed on poetry"

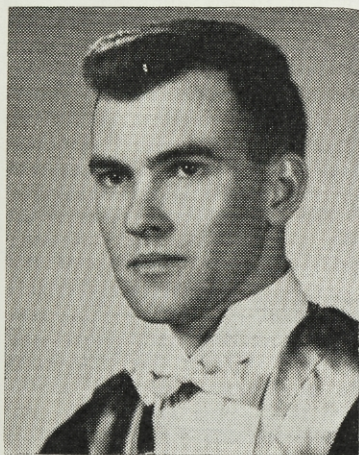
The glittering lights of St. Peter's Bay shone brightly on May 6, 1942 to welcome Jean, only child of Mr. and Mrs. John MacIsaac.

Marian Agnes McGinn — Arts

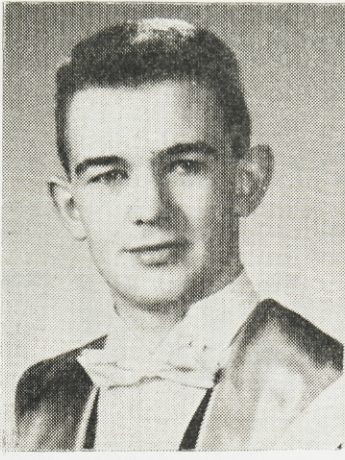
"The crown of Glory is hers to wear who works with fidelity and care."

Best of luck, Jim.



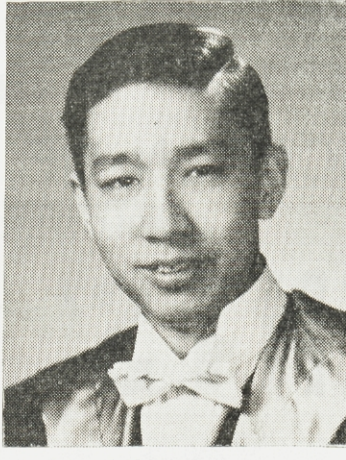
Patricia Anne Poirier — Arts

Again, good luck and best of everything John.



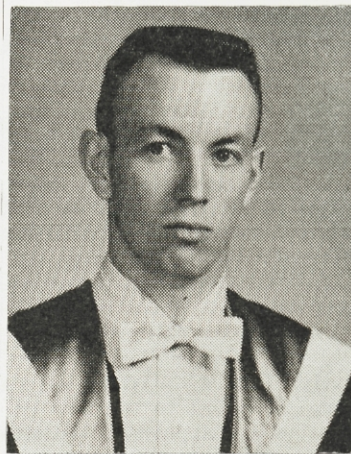
Gerald Henry McCarthy

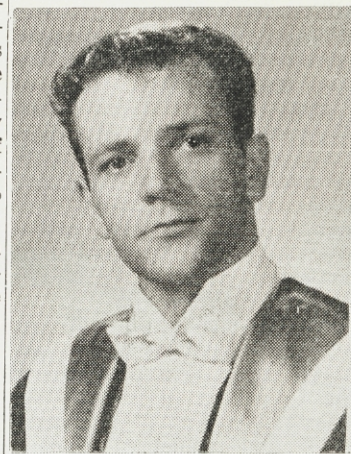
George James Kelly

Joseph Alexander Michael

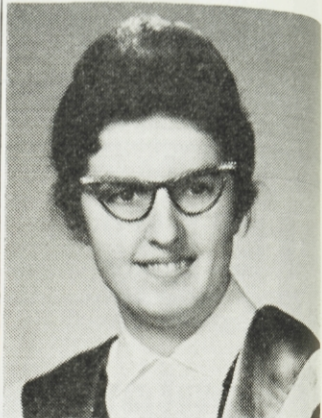
Nolin — Arts
