HOCKEY

Gone from this year's hockey team were such stars as Paul "Buck" Davey, Ray Gionet, Jean-Guy Lemay, Ed MacDonald, "Miner" MacDonald, and Gaston Roy. These players had carried most of the mail for the Saints in both the intercollegiate and Island leagues of the past two years. Other former players, although they are still with us, could not participate in intercollegiate play because of certain rules that declared them ineligible. From this you can see that coach A. J. MacAdam had quite a rebuilding job on hand this year. Considering the loss of many former players and the very uncooperative weather that gave us very little ice in our college rink, we think that Mr. MacAdam came up with as strong a team as possible under such conditions. We think that although this year's team was not well rewarded as far as games-won are concerned; they, nevertheless, gained plenty of experience and well deserved to wear the Red and White colors.

The Saints entered only the intercollegiate hockey league this year. Both U.N.B. and Mount Allison did strong squads, thus Saint Dunstan's had to be content with no wins in four intercollegiate games. The Saints played exhibition games against Summerside Aces and Charlottetown Royals, two of the teams partaking in the Maritime Senior League. In both of these games, as we expected, the Saints were far outclassed; nevertheless, they gave it all they had. The one game that the Saints managed to win was against no other team but their old rivals the Parkdale Flyers.

MacDonald, Gerard Burns, Reg Peters, Claude Peters, Jack Kane, Rene Rivard, George Keays, Jack Murphy, and Bill O'Neill. Coach—A. J. MacAdam. Manager—Lawrence Gallant.

Coach A. J. MacAdam deserves much credit for his tireless efforts in putting together a team inspite of adverse weather conditions which caused the practices in our college rink to be few. Next year A. J. we hope the weather will be more cooperative and with a few additions we feel sure that the Saints will again be strong contenders for intercollegiate honors. An often forgotten man on the team is the manager. Lawrence Gallant worked hard as manager this year and deserves a word of thanks.

For their first game of the 1957-58 season the Saints, with only three practice sessions under their belts, journeyed to the capital of Prince County, where they played the Summerside Senior Aces in an exhibition game. The Aces had already been playing in the Maritime Senior loop for two weeks, thus they showed too much power and conditioning for the shortwinded Saints, as they rapped in twelve goals to beat the Saints 12-3. Almost everyone who saw this game said that it was far closer than the score indicated. Reg Peters, Jack Kane, and Gerry Burns potted the disc for the Saints.

On Saturday, January 18 the Saints motored to Sackville for the opening game in the intercollegiate league against Mount Allison. Once again the Mounties began to rap in goals in the later stages of the game to whip the faltering Saints 5-2. In this game Redmond, the Saints net-minder, received a slight concussion and was replaced by King. The Saints first tally came off the stick of Jack Kane assisted by Reg Peters. Gerry Burns blinked the light for the second goal with Kane drawing an assist.

The Saints played their second exhibition game of the season against the Charlottetown Royals. Jack MacDonald, starry forward with the Saints, was missing from the line-up with an injured foot. The Saints found a capable replacement in high-school star Billy Mulligan who scored two goals. Ray Hache also notched two, while singles went to "Sandy" MacDonald, Claude Peters, Dolie Murphy, and Bill O'Neill. At one stage in the game the hard working Saints were holding a 4-2 lead, but they could not withstand the third period drive of the Royals, who walked off with a 12-8 victory.

On the night of February 8, the Saints suffered their second intercollegiate defeat as U.N.B. Red Raiders racked up an 8-4 victory. In the late stages of the first period the Saints were leading 5-1 but their pace slackened in the last two sessions. "Sandy" MacDonald scored three of the Saints' goals while the other one went to Reg Peters. The Saints were still without the services of J. R. MacDonald, who was stranded on his way back from the Maritime Model Parliament at Antigonish.

The Saints won their only victory of the season on February 16, when they defeated the Parkdale Flyers 7-5 in the college rink. The Saints were without several of their forwards who were home for the weekend. Jack Murphy was the star of the game as he scored three goals.

The weekend of February 21 and 22 was one of the blackest for a St. Dunstan's squad in a number of years, as they motored to New Brunswick for their last two games of the season. On Friday night in Sackville the Saints went down to defeat 8-0 at the hands of the Mt. Allison Mounties. On the following night in Fredericton the U.N.B. Red Raiders blinked the light ten times as they won a 10 to 1 victory. Redmond goalied the first game, and was replaced by King for the second game. The lone goal was scored by Gerry Burns.

BASKETBALL

Although the Saints failed to win the N.B.—P.E.I. Intercollegiate basketball crown, they had more success than their hockey counterparts. Father McGuigan had most of his boys back from last year except Dave Betz and John "Hondo" Kelly, who this year is playing for U.N.B. The Saints relied mainly upon Gerry Tingley of Campbellton, N.B. and Charlottetown's Lorne McGuigan for most of their scoring power. Other members of this year's team are as follows: "Chick" Morrison, Mike Swift, William Farmer, Peter McGonnell, Brian Noonan, Bob Fearon, Tom Ledwell, Gil Collins, Pat Hengen, and Bob Linegar.

The Saints hopes were hard hit after Christmas when they suffered the loss of center Gil Collins, who was the main cog in the St. Dunstan's football machine last fall.

Although Gil was unable to play this year, we hope that his health will permit him to return to our campus next year and to participate in both football and basketball.

The Saints were outstanding all season in exhibition games, but not nearly so successful in intercollegiate contests. So far this year they lost only one exhibition game, and that was to Saint John Y.M.C.A. in a game played in Saint John. Since then the Saints have beaten this same team twice by scores of 57-53 and 71-42. The Saints also have been victorious over Summerside R.C.A.F., Chatham R.C.A.F., Stadacona Sailors, Moncton Movers, and Nova Scotia Tech.

The Saints made their first intercollegiate start on January 25th against Mount Allison on the S.D.U. court. They showed brilliant form in almost every department as they streaked to a 65-49 victory.

The home team led by the fancy sharpshooting of captain Lorne McGuigan, who swished through 22 points, built up a ten point first half lead and finished the contest with 16 points to spare. Pete McGonnell and Gerry Tingley backed up Lorne's efforts as they netted 12 points each. The defensive star of the game was Chick Morrison who worked like a fiend in breaking up plays and snatching rebounds. A total of 51 fouls were called by referees Howatt and Hepburn during the rugged encounter.

This initial success of the Saints in intercollegiate circles soon ended. In their first encounter with the U.N.B. Red Raiders the Saints were defeated by nineteen points. They hoped to be able to overcome this deficit on their home court, and thus keep their championship hopes alive, but the college boys from Fredericton once again overpowered the Saints. The score in this game was 47-40.

On March 1 the final intercollegiate game was played in Sackville. The Mounties on this occasion avenged their first defeat at the hands of the Saints, as they won their first victory in four years by downing the Saints 77-58. Once again Lorne McGuigan was the Saints high scorer.

The end of the intercollegiate league does not spell the end for basketball as far as S.D.U. is concerned this year. The varsity squad are also entered in the Maritime Senior B play-offs, and judging from their success in exhibition games, we would not be surprised if the Saints walked off with honors in this class.

SECOND TEAM BASKETBALL

The Second Team Saints entered the Island Basketball league again this year. They have been quite successful. Last week when the schedule ended they were in second place in the six team loop. They were defeated only three times all season, twice by the third place P.W.C. team and once by the first place Trotters.

On March 12, the Saints won the first game of the semi-finals by defeating the Summerside R.C.A.F. Sultans by the score of 51-28. It looks like the Saints stand a good chance of capping this series and going on to win the finals.
