REV. JOHN J. MacDONALD

In the death of Rev. J. J. MacDonald, pastor of Summerside, St. Dunstan's has lost a sincere and devoted friend. The failing health which dogged his path for the past few years was not considered serious, and it was a surprise to all when, on October 20th, the grim reaper called time to his activities. Father John was always a veritable dynamo of energy and any cause that he espoused was sure to prosper, was sure to succeed, if success was within possible reach. He was a leader of men, but a pastor of souls first; and his zealous work in Kinkora, Seven Mile Bay, Borden, and latterly in Summerside will long be remembered, and his name long cherished by those people for whom and with whom he worked. In public affairs when any worthy cause presented itself, he was untiring in his effective efforts in that behalf. As organizer of the Patriotic Fund in war-time, he was known far beyond the limits of the Province for the success he achieved. A host of other activities might be cited. That his work both in Church affairs and in public affairs was so successful is due in a large part to the measure of

enthusiasm he elicited, the generous self-sacrifice he showed, and the natural sincerity and honesty of his character.

The above personal traits were known to all; but to those who were privileged to know him as a host, and their name is legion, Father John was the soul of kindness and hospitality. His handclasp of welcome conveyed the feeling of his generous heart. Nothing was an inconvenience, nothing was a trouble. His whole demeanor showed the honest joy he took in being kind to friends.

Many alumni have cause to remember his interest in St. Dunstan's; not only his long service as member of the Board of Governors, but also as a never-failing contributor to the prize list on convocation day. He was a good priest, a genial friend, a thorough gentleman; may his virtues be imitated, may his memory be cherished, may his soul rest in peace.

Archbishop MacGuigan recently made a call on us while on a visit to his home in Charlottetown. We are pleased to see him looking so well and to receive the glad tidings of the timely relief of his subjects in the West. He reports conditions to be somewhat improved, and is optimisite for the future. We extend best wishes to him and to those entrusted to his care for the true progress of a Christian people.

Mr. Reginald J. McLean, ex. '04, manager of the Crown Lumber Co., Calgary, Alta. spent three weeks with us recently. He came to the Island in October to the bedside of his uncle, Rev. Mgr. J. C. McLean, who at that time was seriously ill in the Charlottetown Hospital. He acted as chaplain in the recent Great War and later returned to the Halifax diocese in which he laboured until the time of his death. He has made many friends on the Island, as he was an annual visitor, and thus his memory will be long cherished by those who were fortunate enough to know him. His remains were laid to rest in his native parish in Lot 65. Requiescat in pace.
