From the face off our boys started to rush things and within five minutes after the game started, Doyle our speedy rover drove in the first goal for his team. Play then zigzagged from one end of the rink to the other until Murphy, by a sensational rush, carried the puck the whole length of the rink and could most probably have scored, but applying the principal of "safety first", passed to Steele who slammed in the second count. No other scoring was done during this half although both goal keepers were kept pretty busy.
