

Atlantic Football Conference Formed: S. D. U. Participates

This past summer, a new football league, the Atlantic Football Conference, was formed. It consists of two divisions, A and B, with B-Division broken down into two sections, the Prince Edward Island - Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick sections. The president of this new league is Mr. Phil Carr-Harris, and the chairman of the B-division is Mr. MacAdam, member of the staff and director of athletics at S. D. U.

Since Saint Dunstan's is a member of B-division, interest will be paramount in it. Five teams are to participate in this league:

Saint Dunstan's University
Acadia University
Shearwater Navy
Dalhousie Junior Varsity
Saint Francis Xavier Junior Varsity.

The new league is to follow the C. R. U. rules. There are no play-offs scheduled, the winner to be declared at the conclusion of the season. Standings are to be kept on a point basis, two points being given for a win and one for a tie. In the event that a tie should occur at the end of the regular season, a winner will be announced on a "For and against" basis in scoring.

The series is to be a round robin series, each team playing every other team once, thus giving two home games and two games on the road. As this would include four games only, hopes have been expressed that one or two exhibition games would possibly be played. The first game is scheduled for October 1, with the Saints playing host to Shearwater Navy.

Turning to the home scene, the biggest news is the appointment of Mr. Edward Hilton, as coach of the football and basketball teams. Mr. Hilton is also a new member of the faculty in the commerce division. A native of Bingham, Maine, he received his preliminary education in Portland, Maine. For two years he was a member of the United States Intelligence at Izmir, Turkey. He received a bachelor of commerce from Saint Francis Xavier University, Antigonish,

where he also played football and basketball, and was assistant coach in 1958. Last year he coached in Maine before accepting this new position on our campus. On behalf of everyone concerned, we wish to extend Mr. Hilton a cordial welcome and success in the tremendous tasks ahead.

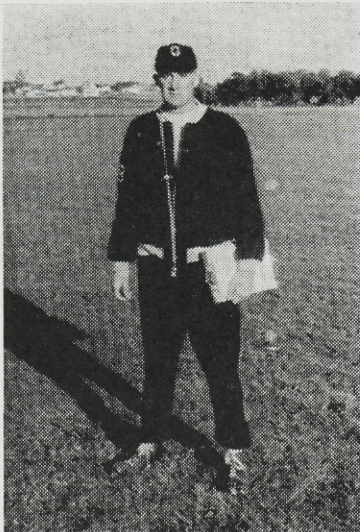

Whether he can do it, only time will tell, but the staff of Red and White wish to extend to Mr. Hilton and his team best wishes for success in the tasks which lie ahead of them. We will follow their progress with keen interest.

Junior Varsity Team To Be Formed Large Turnout

Again this year, as in the past few years, a Junior Varsity Football Team is in the process of being formed under the direction of Father Ledwell. The call for players resulted in forty to forty-five reporting for action when the first work out was held on Friday afternoon, September 16. These were later to be thinned down to the regular number.

The purpose of forming this team includes not only a team entry into a junior level of competition but also an instrument for teaching promising young players the game to fill the ranks of the varsity squad. This proved very true this year when several of last year's junior players were promoted to varsity to fill vacancies resulting from graduation.

Father Ledwell is seeking to enter his team in a new league which, if formed, will include Saint Dunstan's Junior Varsity, Mount Allison Junior Varsity, and Prince of Wales College as participants. The league awaits approval by the Amateur Athletic Association. Other years the games consisted of a play-off series with Prince of Wales College and a few other exhibition games.

Red-Hot Race

This summer in the American Baseball League we have a red-hot pennant race. The Baltimore Orioles have been giving the New York Yankees a real tough go of it in comparison with other years when the Yankees had practically no competition, except for last year when the Yankees were completely out of the picture. brevity of the season, hopes have been expressed that one, possibly two exhibition games could be played by the S. D. U. squad. One would be played on Thanksgiving Day, October 8, the other, if obtained, on a date yet to be announced.

Field Day Set For Oct. 4

With the annual Saint Dunstan's field day this year scheduled for October 4, the keen competition experienced other years is again expected to express itself. Last year, with challenges posted on many bulletin boards, class prestige more or less hung in the balance and a brilliant effort by the Seniors resulted in their coming out on top of the list. Bernard Lee, a first year engineer from Hong Kong, also set a new record for the Standing Broad Jump, 9.55 ft., thereby meriting his "D". Another "D" was merited by Frank Gillis after amassing a sparkling total of 21 points, four over the required number.

Since this meet is the chief event in track and field, students are urged not only to participate, but also to practice and put on their best possible showing. There are many records that can be broken and many "D" 's that can be earned.

George MacDonald who held this position for many years.

On Friday, September 16, a Solemn High Mass was celebrated in the college chapel to implore divine assistance for both students and faculty during the academic year. The chapel was swelled with the attendance of both day students and co-eds. Celebrant of the Mass was Monsignor Sullivan, with Fr. Cameron, deacon, and Fr. MacLellan, sub-deacon. Monsignor Sullivan also preached an appropriate sermon for the occasion.

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
