

ST. DUNSTAN'S HOCKEY SAINTS CRUSHES DAL AND MEMORIAL

The S.D.U. hockey team has passed its first four tests with flying colors, blitzing Dal 8-2, and 10-1, and crushing Memorial 9-4, and 4-1.

The Saints had little trou-

ble downing a poor Dal squad. The Red and White outskated, outhit, and outshot the Tigers.

Rookie Bobby Doherty led the assault in the first game with a pair of goals while

Ralph McCully, Bill Adams, Bill LeClair, Alan Flood, Kenny Ballem, and Dennis Affleck added singles.

With Mike Brown in nets for the second game, it was Alan Flood's hat trick which paced the way. McCully and Blaine Jelly aided the cause with a pair each, while Bill Carson, LeClair, and Doherty each added singles.

The play of Kane's forces was much better the following weekend, but it had to be as they opened league play against a surprisingly sharp Memorial team. The play of Affleck and Ballem was exceptionally sharp as they permitted only 18 shots on McQuaid.

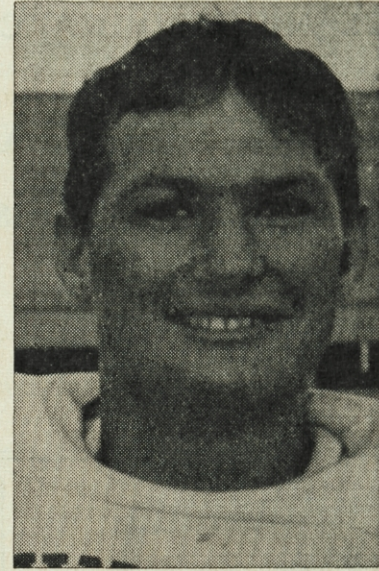

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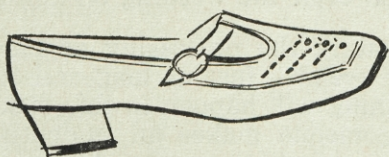
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
