Because staff members are awarded, and rightly so, points for their services, it is usually to members of the staff that the D is awarded; non-staff contributors who win D's are very few in number. The Literary D is a certificate of attestation and a gold ring with the Red and White crest superimposed on it. Contributors who have acquired a total of twenty or more points are awarded a gold pin, which has the same crest as the ring but prized much more highly.

The prize is a worthy one, and one that you will be extremely proud of; get busy with that pen and paper and see what you can do towards meriting a Literary D. To students who are here for the first time, we make bold to offer a piece of advice: take an interest in your magazine by contributing to it. If you will heed this friendly advice, the Literary D, in all probability, will be yours by the time that you are ready to graduat.

In our May issue (1947), we unintentionally neglected to mention the names of those who won Literary D's last year. We now take refuge behind the old proverb, "better late than never", offer our congratulations to all four and say a sincere "thank you" for a job well done. The gold pin was won by John Eldon Green '47, who was last year's editor; and a ring was awarded to each of the following: Francis Bolger '47, Ernest Hemphill '49 and Cyril Sinnott '49.
