MEETINGS ATTENDED

The annual M. I. D. L. Conference, held at Kings' College, Halifax, on October 15th and 16th, was attended this

year by Alton Craig and Stephen Fitzgerald of S. D. U. The most important business of the conference was the adoption of a revised constitution, with some of the more important changes pertaining to the system of marking debates, the defining of the powers of the M. I. D. L. Executive, and the setting of a time limit for all debates. St. Dunstan's has donated a trophy, to be called the Abegweit Trophy, to replace the T. Eaton Trophy, which is now in the permanent possession of St. Dunstan's, in virtue of its three Maritime Debating Championships.

St. Dunstan's was represented at the annual W.U.S.C. (World University Service of Canada) and the annual N.F.C.U.S. (National Federation of Canadian University Students) Conferences this year by Mr. J. H. Richard Wedge, chairman of the WUSC and NFCUS Committees on the campus.

The annual W.U.S.C. conference was held at the University of Toronto from October 15th to the 17th. Approximately 45 students from 18 universities across Canada were present. The two most important decisions reached by the delegates were, firstly, to adopt the Patna Health Centre as the National Project for 1955, secondly, to hold the annual W.U.S.C. Seminars in Japan in the summer of '55.

From the 18th to the 23rd of October, Mr. Wedge attended the 18th Annual N.F.C.U.S. Conference also held at the University of Toronto. There were 90 delegates present with nearly every Canadian University being represented at that conference. The more important discussions centered around the affiliation of N.F.C.U.S. with the communist dominated I.U.S. (International Union of Students), and government scholarships and bursaries.

Mr. Urban MacLellan represented us at the tenth annual convention of the Canadian Federation of Catholic College Students which was held at Loyola College, Montreal, under the joint auspices of Loyola and Marianapolis Colleges.

Including Mr. MacLellan, there were delegates from thirteen colleges attending the convention which commenced on Thursday, October 14, and continued until Sunday, October 17.

The main question up for discussion on Friday was the adoption of a new constitution, and after lengthy discussion it was tabled. On Saturday was the reading of the reports from the previous assembly.

At this conference was the appointment of two new national projects which were undertaken by member colleges for the year '54-55. The first was a decision to campaign for the transmission of Bishop Fulton J. Sheen's television program, "Life is worth Living", over the Canadian CBC channels. It was also decided to set up a commission for the purpose of study the Papal Encyclicals, and interpreting them to Catholic Youth.

Our delegates believe that if these projects undertaken for this year, prove a success, then better interest in the Federation should result.

NECROLOGY

We mourn the passing of our beloved Chancellor and Bishop, The Most Reverend James Boyle, who died in a hospital in London, England, while en route to Rome for his "ad limina" visit. Bishop Boyle was born on August 9, 1885, was ordained on May 17, 1913. He was consecrated Bishop of Charlottetown on June 6, 1944, which diocese he served faithfully for the remaining ten years of his fruitful life. He was called to his Creator on the third of June, 1954.

Those ten years during which our beloved Bishop served the Diocese of Charlottetown and the people of Prince Edward Island as their pastoral shepherd, and St. Dunstan's, as its Chancellor, were years of advancement and progress for us, not only intellectually and economically, but also and in particular, spiritually. His achievements will be so recorded in the pages of history that many years will come and go before the memory of Bishop Boyle even begins to fade. And his achievements must be so recorded in the book of life, that we are sure that this faithful servant of the Lord has received that crown which he so deservedly merited.

It is said that if a man has led a truly fruitful life, then the world should be so much better when he leaves it than when he came into it, because of his living in it. This adage applies perfectly to our beloved Bishop, who has made the world, and especially Prince Edward Island the better because of his fruitful and exemplary life.
