

Athletics

This year St. Dunstan's is celebrating her centennial year. For one hundred years she has been carrying out her primary aim which is the instilling of the principles of Faith and Science into the minds of her students. She has also been aware that the moral and mental development is most successful where the healthy soul is in a strong, active body. It is with this in view then that St. Dunstan's has always cared for the physical development of her students by the promotion of an extensive athletic program, so designed as to be most beneficial to the students.

Hockey is making a come-back and is becoming our most popular winter sport. With the formation of the City League this winter, interest among the students has been keener than for the past five years. Coach A. J. MacAdam has worked hard to produce a good team this year and we feel that they will give a good account of themselves.

On the basketball front, the Saints have recaptured the N.B.-P.E.I. Intercollegiate title which they won last year. Faculty Adviser, Father McGuigan should be commended for the job he has so successfully handled.

BASKETBALL

This year there are two teams representing the College in outside competition. Our first team is entered in a four team Island League as well as the N.B.-P.E.I. Intercollegiate League. The second team is entered in the newly formed City Basketball League, which includes P.W.C., Nomads, Globe Trotters and the Saints.

At press time the first team is undefeated in Island League play, and are heavy favorites to capture the title. In the Intercollegiate League the Saints have once again won the N.B.-P.E.I. championship. For a team with only four of last year's players on its roster, they are doing exceptionally well. Back from last year are playing coach, Jack Reardon, Bob Mooney, Gus Dorais and John Taylor. Big factors in the team's success this season are the re-

bounding of John Taylor and the superb play-making of guard Gus Dorais, Reardon, a marked man in intercollegiate games, is still able to come through with many points per game.

This year the second team is once again under the capable guidance of coach Bob Mooney. The team is composed of high school boys, and Bob, by his diligent work, is forming them into a well coordinated team. There are several players on this team who, with experience, will strengthen our first team in the years to come. This team is entered in the City League and is making a very good showing.
