A. J. MacAdam began the formation of this year's varsity football squad early in September and, adding several newcomers to the returned veterans, he, with the aid of F.O Ray Kaduck, had a team in shape to play the visiting Acadia squad on Thanksgiving Monday.

The two teams were rated just about even, but the Saints displayed definite superiority in winning the hard fought tussle 35-12. Lennie Ellis charged over for the Saints early in the first quarter. The convert was no good and, a few minutes later, Tingley caught Arsenault's 35 yard pass for another major; he also converted. Murphy climaxed the Acadia comeback with a six pointer and the kick failed. The Saints scored eight more points before the half with Tingley taking another long pass in the end zone and again getting the convert. Jim Bentham booted a single deep into Acadia territory to make the score 21-6 at the half.

Acadia's defense stiffened in the second half and they scored on a short line plunge in the third quarter. The kick was again no good. Paul Arsenault, calling the signals for the Saints, collected a major soon after and Tingley again converted. Charlie Sark hit paydirt late in the game on a ten yard run and the convert failed.

Bentham booted another long single and that ended the scoring for the day.

The second intercollegiate game was against the powerful U.N.B. squad the following Saturday and, after stopping the Red Bombers cold for the first half, the Saints went down to a 54-2 defeat. The Red & White lads held the play for the first quarter and most of the second, but U.N.B. started to roll in the last of the second and the Saints were saved from a whitewashing only when defensive guard Frank Driscoll made good on a safety touch. Bolitho had three majors for the visitors; MacLellan had two and four converts. Singles went to Hughes and Ciotti.

The Saints lost three men in this game because of injuries. Parker Lund suffered a broken leg and Ian MacDonald badly bruised ribs. Don LeClair was sidelined with a broken jaw and all three were lost for the rest of the season.

After a week's layoff, the Saints travelled to Halifax to meet Saint Mary's the latter emerged victorious with a slim margin of 8 points, 39-31. Bentham roared 79 yards off-tackle on the first play of the game for a major and life looked rosy. However, St. Mary's evened the score minutes later and the two teams settled down to battle it out. The Islanders showed a very strong ground attack which gained them five majors. Bentham and Arsenaull collected two apiece and Hache the other. Tingley made good on one convert and two pass attempts failed. Injuries cut down the effectiveness of many of the Saints as they were called upon to go both ways in the second half. But, the boys did their best and that is all we asked of them.

THE THIN RED LINE

The last game of the season against Mount Allison was the last game for twelve members of the team this year, seniors who are due to graduate this spring. A sea of mud spotted here and there with puddles of water was the scene of battle, and on such a battlefield did the Saints prove their right to compete with the larger Maritime universities in intercollegiate football. This they accomplished before bowing to a graceful 7-0 defeat and considering we offer no scholarships and that very few of the squad have any experience at the game, it was quite a feat indeed. It is not too far fetched to say that the "breaks" decided the outcome of the match and all the players, Mount Allison's as well as our own, will readily agree that the score could very easily have been reversed.

And so, the record books are closed on another football season and a long look reveals the fact that two touchdowns kept the Saints out of second place. We are quite confident that the books will show, in the not too distant future, that St. Dunstan's has hit stride and is bringing home the titles as in the past in rugby.

JUNIOR VARSITY

Father Ledwell formed his JV squad again this year and the team played a five game series with Prince of Wales College of Charlottetown and a home and home series with the Mount Allison Juniors. This year's edition of the varsity sports several members from Fr. Ledwell's endeavor last season and they have proven their worth.

An exhibition game against P.W.C. early in the season was won by the Saints very easily 49-12. Mike O'Brien and Basil Gillan collected two each and singles went to Frank Garrity, who graduated to the varsity ranks, Pete Steele, and Jim Pelrine. Gil Collins racked up seven points on converts and a safety touch.

The first game of the series was won by the Saints by a convincing margin, 31-6. Pelrine called the shots for the Saints and hit paydirt on one occasion. O'Brien had a big day with three majors and Gillan picked up the other. John Todd also picked up a point on a convert attempt.

Memorial Field was the battlefield for the second match and the Saints once again emerged victorious. The score this time was 31-12. Collins was back calling signals and he notched his first TD of the season. O'Brien and Gillan once again came through with two apiece. P.W.C. is steadily becoming stronger as they gain experience and will soon be a foe not to be trifled with in any mean manner.

The JV squad travelled to Mount Allison and very decisively defeated their hosts 37-0. O'Brien crossed the line three times, Collins, Cameron, and Tingley once apiece. Fr. Ledwell had high praise for the offensive line's blocking and said that the defensive held very well.

It finally happened—the under-rated P.W.C. team from the City took the Junior Saints to the cleaners on a cold November afternoon when they won the third game of the series when they outplayed the favoured Saints to win 13-8. This was the first defeat suffered by the Saints in two years. The Welshmen scored early in the first quarter and Kane made good on the convert. Collins launched a combined ground-air attack in the second half which resulted in a major and his convert tied the score. Play passed from one end of the field to the other until late in the fourth frame when Kane took to the air and set up the second P.W.C. TD which he made on a line plunge off-tackle. The convert failed. The City team had earned their victory and they richly deserved their triumph.

Mount Allison Juniors came to St. Dunstan's for the return game of the home and home series and the Saints easily won the second tussle 39-1. Collins smoothly manipulated his squad into scoring position again and again, escaping time after time from almost impossible traps behind his own line to complete the play called. Gillan collected two majors and singles went to O'Brien, Simmons, Trainor, and Driscoll. Collins had three points on two conversions and one rouge.

The Juniors won the five game series by taking the fourth game at St. Dunstan's gridiron on Wednesday afternoon, November 18. The ground was frozen but the players were unaware of this as they concentrated their efforts on the task at hand. P.W.C. took an early lead when Kane booted deep into Red & White territory and then fell on the ball in the end zone when a Saint failed to recover. His convert was good and no scoring occurred until late in the half when Driscoll collected his first of the day. Collins went over for a major in the second half and Driscoll notched his second big one. O'Brien forced a single pointer and Cameron converted two.

And so, that is the football story at St. Dunstan's for this year. The Varsity squad did as well as they were expected to do and the Juniors surprised very few people when they won the title. However we would like to extend our congratulations to "Mac MacDonald and his very game Welshman squad for the marked improvement they manifested in the series, and say that we feel sure that they will begin to give the Juniors a great deal of trouble on the gridiron in the very near future.

There is some talk at present of forming a three team loop consisting of Saint Dunstan's Juniors, the Welshmen, and the Mount Allison Juniors. We would like to see such a league a reality. The general public would certainly become more conscious of the wonderful sport and we are sure the calibre of ball played would be worth the watching.

BASKETBALL

At the time of writing, there is nothing definite available concerning the 1959-1960 basketball picture as far as a set schedule is concerned.

Father Charles MacDonald has been appointed to the position of head basketball coach to replace retiring Father Walter MacGuigan who, for many years, kept the game alive at St. Dunstan's. As usual, the varsity team will be entered in intercollegiate competition with Mount Allison and University of New Brunswick with a home and home series being played. Whether or not they will be entered in any other league or competition will be decided at some later date.

Graduation took the majority of last year's squad and Fr. MacDonald will be faced with the prospect of forming a team consisting of only a few veterans and many new men. However, the picture isn't as grim as it looks. Lorne MacGuigan, Bob Linegar, Ken MacKinnon, and Gerry Tingley are still on the campus and eligible to play and there are several new faces. Among them are: Jack Hopper, a guard; Joe Sassi, a forward, Keenan Marr, centre, and Roland Fairly, another guard. Whether or not these men make the team will be answered with the passage of time but it looks as if we will have one of the best teams in recent years this season.

The Saints played the travelling Canadian Roadkings the middle of November and notched their first victory of the season by winning 48-45. Nothing was definitely decided by this game as this was the first time the boys had worked together this season. However, the picture appears brighter and brighter and we must now wait for future games before reaching a decision as to what type of squad we will have this year.

HOCKEY

Father Frank Ledwell, the highly successful coach of the Junior Varsity football squad, has been handed the responsibility of coaching the hockey team this season and he began getting the boys in shape early in November.
