SAINTS MOVE INTO FINAL LAP OF SCHEDULE

The St. Dunstan's University Football team, hampered all season by unfortunate injuries to several key players, turns in to the stretch drive of the season with two home games against Mount Allison Mounties and the University of New Brunswick Red Bombers.

Looking at the results of the games played earlier in the schedule, it would appear that the Saints are in an excellent position to win both. Mount "A" excluding the games played this past weekend, has not yet tasted victory, while they have fallen to both U.N.B. and Acadia. Coach Hilton says he expects to have every body available for this weekend, with the exception of Bob Fellows, out with a broken ankle, and Vince Fisher, out with a broken wrist.

In the individual scoring race, Darryl Burgess . . .

Darryl Burgess of the league-leading St. Mary's Huskies regained first place in the Blue-nose Football Conference scoring race over the weekend with his 18 point performance against St. Dunstan's.

Leader after the first week of action, Burgess collected three touchdowns in the Huskies 67-0 win over the Saints to move two points ahead of teammate Jim Stewart and St. Francis Xavier's Ed Amaral, who was on top last week. Burgess has 38 points on six TDs

and two singles while Stewart and Amaral share second with 36 points each.

Stewart, a rookie halfback with SMU, made the biggest jump over the past seven days climbing from a tie for eleventh to a tie for the runner-up spot with his five majors last Saturday. Amaral picked up 13 points on one touchdown, six converts and a single against Dalhousie.

Bruce Racicot of St. F.X. scored three TDs to take fourth place with 24 points while Jim Griffith dropped two notches to fifth with 19 points. Group-

ed in sixth position are Roger Sevigny of St. F.X., Acadia's Jim Cairns and Ross St. Germain of UNB with 18 points each.

Keith Caldwell of Acadia is in ninth place with 13 points and eight others are deadlocked in a tie for tenth with 12 points apiece.

As a team St. Francis Xavier lead the league in two departments, total offense and defense. The powerful Xaverians have played only two games compared to three for each other team but have racked up the almost unbelievable total

of 133 points while allowing no points to be scored against them. On the other extreme are Dalhousie and Mount Allison. The Tigers have scored but five points while the Mounties have allowed 128.

In conference standings St. Mary's took over sole possession of first place with six points on a 3-0 record. St. F.X., Acadia and UNB each have a piece of second with four points apiece while St. Dunstan's is in fifth with two points. Mount Allison and Dalhousie, both winless to date in three starts, occupy the basement.

BILLY DOING WELL WITH CANADIAN NATIONALS

Billy MacMillan, a 23 year old hockey star who has starred in every conceivable level of organized hockey, save for the Island farm leagues, is playing out of Winnipeg this year where he is a member of Canada's national team. This all Canada club will compete with all the European teams at a tournament in Colorado Springs sometime after Christmas.

For anybody who has taken even a passive interest in hockey in the Maritimes in the past while, MacMillan is no stranger. Six or seven years ago, he burned up the Charlottetown minor leagues, and then moved to St. Michael's College in Toronto where he worked under the tutelage of Rev. David Bauer, Canada's foremost amateur coach. It was in 1963 that instead of signing a major league contract that MacMillan decided to further his studies, and so returned to Charlottetown and enrolled here at St. Dunstan's.

In two years of intercollegiate play, he won or captured or broke every trophy, record, or anything else available, and led the Saints to their greatest heights in history. This year, accepting an invitation from Father Bauer, Billy moved to the University of Manitoba, the host campus for the national team.

Manitoba has something like ten thousand students, so it's not surprising that he finds a difference. "The big difference," he says, "is the atmosphere. It's so friendly at S.D.U., while out here I feel completely lost; the place is really impersonal."

"There are rumours going around here (the Manitoba campus) that the club will be going to the Maritimes for a

game sometimes this winter. However, no place or date has been decided upon as yet. But an All-star team from the M.I.H.L. would give the best competition that could be assembled in those parts. It's too bad that the college rink at SDU couldn't hold more people."

Billy is really high on the National team and their chances this year. He notes that most of the players should, and could, play pro hockey. "Some of the guys are really amazing, unbelievably shifty with the puck. Here checking as well as offensive plays are stressed mostly in our practices."

With regards to the teams schedule," he says that they will play the Ruskies (the Russian team) something like six times before the tournament in Yugoslavia." Then there is a tournament in the States at Colorado Springs on the 26th of December against Swedes, the Czechs, and the Ruskies. Marj will appreciate the fact that we'll be away for Christmas!"

Bill speaks warmly of his two years here at SDU, and suggests a booster club dinner here at the college for the Varsity sports promotion. A speaker, Rev. David Bauer.

Hockey Team Meets Rink Opens November 1st

About twenty students met last week in an informal meeting with A.J. MacAdam, Athletic Director of SDU, and Jack Kane, hockey coach, to discuss the ground rules for the coming hockey season. Most of last year's players did not attend, for the meeting dealt mainly with the supplying of equipment, pre-season training, and changes in the rules made last year.

Mr. MacAdam said that the rink will have ice by the beginning of November, and practices will start at that time. He cited the three rule changes that affect intercollegiate students are the following: any student who moves to another university for a reason other than to get a course not offered in the first will not be eligible to play that year. Students who play on intercollegiate teams are no longer permitted to play with any other clubs. Thirdly a student can play only four years of hockey in intercollegiate play.

Mr. Kane welcomed the new students to the hockey training and asked that any students who were unable to attend we still welcome to come out to practices. He gave a brief outline of what the training would consist of, and explained the changes in the schedule, the principal one being the fact that for the first time, all teams will play all the others on an equal home and home basis.

This year the Saints will play fourteen games, three more than last year, three before Christmas and eleven after the holidays.
