

AD MULTOS ANNOS

The past twenty-five years have witnessed the birth and growth to maturity of the first and only Congregation of Religious Sisters ever founded in this province. On July 17, 1916, four young women enrolled as the first members of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Martha of Prince Edward Island. At that time, the infant Congregation had headquarters in the Convent at St. Dunstan's College. Later, Mount St. Mary's, the present Motherhouse, was obtained. To-day, our Island Community numbers seventy nine professed Sisters.

The inestimable importance of the Sisters of St. Martha to the Diocese of Charlottetown is fully appreciated by too few of us. To their maternal charge have been entrusted the Charlottetown Hospital, Sacred Heart Home, St. Vincent's Orphanage, and the domestic work at St. Dunstan's College and Bishop's Residence. The Sisters of St. Stanislaus Convent conduct Kinkora School. The Sisters also conduct catechetical summer schools throughout the Diocese, supervise the preparations for Diocesan Eucharistic Congresses, and carry on many other activities that demand that thoroughness and perfection of accomplishment attainable only by the expert hands of Sisters.

This year, one of their number, Sister Mary Peter, B. A., who is a member of our Graduating Class, has the distinction of being the first Religious Sister ever graduated by St. Dunstan's. Climaxing one of the most distinguished academic careers in the history of the College, she brings glory to St. Dunstan's and to the Congregation of St. Martha by winning the Bachelor of Arts degree summa cum laude. To Sister Mary Peter, "Red and White" ex-

tends heartiest congratulations.

Anticipating the formal celebration of the Silver Jubilee of their Congregation on July 26, "Red and White" extends to the Reverend Superior General, Mother M. Paula, and to all the Sisters of St. Martha, felicitations and sincere good wishes. AD MULTOS FAUSTISSI-MOSQUE ANNOS!
