## REVEREND JOHN A. MACDONALD

"Life's a short summer—Man a flower; He dies—alas! How soon he dies."

Another of the stalwarts of the diocese has passed away in the death of Father John A. Macdonald of Grand River. For half a century his name has been synonymous with vigor, energy, and an active priesthood. He was one of the long line of Macdonalds given to the diocese by St. Andrew's parish, whose work fills noble annals in her history. He was a nephew of Monsignor James Macdonald, and of Father Dan.; and a first cousin of Bishop Charles, Father Donald Francis, and Father Gregory, all of whom are deceased.

Father John entered St. Dunstan's in eighteen seventyfour and remained here till eighteen eighty, when he went to Quebec for his philosophy and theology. Because of great need at home he was recalled while yet an ecclesiastic to teach at the College, when it was taken over from the Jesuits in eighteen eight-one. In eighteen eighty-two he returned to Quebec to complete his course, and was ordained there on January fourth, eighteen eighty-five. For a short time he worked on the Cathedral staff, but the most part of the next four years was spent teaching at the College. Many a student of those days can attest to his bright mind and effective teaching; and not one of them but will recount stories of his valor on the campus. Truly, his deeds on the football field may someday reach the height of legends. It was during Father John's time here that Father Ryan in collaboration with Father John formulated the motto that has since stood unchanged: "Ex eodem fonte fides et scientia."

In eighteen eighty-nine he was appointed pastor of Miscouche and Wellington. For a short time he attended to Indian River in addition. In Miscouche the present church and parochial house are monuments to his energy. He also instituted a band there, which has continued since, and is now the only one in the Province west of Charlottetown. In nineteen two at the wish of the Bishop he moved to Grand River, whence he attended Wellington, and also Lennox Island. In this last place he was confronted with the task of being not only spiritual father to the Indians, but also, as Indian Commissioner, of being temporal caretaker as well. He fulfilled these duties admirably. A mutual understanding existed between Father John and all the Island Micmacs: his word was law and they accepted it. Yet he was kind to them, and ever their friend. No one could belittle an Indian in his presence without being rebuked.

But "death will have his day," and the genial and kindly soul of Father John has passed to its Maker. On February twenty-seventh his mortal remains were laid to rest in the cemetery of his beloved Grand River. His sterling qualities will long be remembered by those to whom he ministered, and by all who knew him. May he rest in peace.—R. V. M.

Dr. Daly has had a brilliant scholastic career since graduating from St. Dunstan's. He was a Rhodes Scholar, and after studying in English and American universities spent four years at the famed Mayo Clinic where he specialized in internal medicine. Alumni will be pleased to hear of his continued success.

Several members of the Alumni and of our Teaching Staff are doing excellent work along educational lines in a series of radio talks sponsored by the University. Professor J. H. Blanchard, M. A., of Prince of Wales, an authority on Island history, has given a resumé of the history of Prince Edward Island which will be remembered by all because of the clear and able manner in which it was presented. Reverend R. V. MacKenzie gave a very instructive talk on "Training for Leisure," during Educational Week, which has received many favourable comments. Two other members of our staff, who are doing good work in this line, are Dr. J. T. Croteau and Professor D. J. Sullivan, M. A. These men are stimulating a great interest in the economic problems of the day by their enlightening talks entitled "Armchair Economics." Much credit is due Dr. Croteau in particular who has devoted a great deal of time and effort to these broadcasts. All these well-informed men have an increasing number of interested listeners throughout the province and are supplying the need, in-as-far as they are able, of organized Adult Education. Many Alumni and others have expressed their appreciation and interest in this work, with the hope that the University will be able to continue it.

Reports of the provincial election in Quebec last fall show us that Amedee Caron has been re-elected with an increased majority in Iles-de-a-Madeleine. We take this

occasion of sending our congratulations to the popular Vice-President of our Alumni.

A welcome visitor to the college recently was Cyril MacDonald. Cyril seems to have regained most of his old vigour since his serious illness of a few years ago. Red & White wishes him much success in the future.

A member of our Alumni, who is making progress in the field of banking is Charles Leigh, '20. Charlie has recently been promoted from the position of head accountant at Halifax to the Inspector's Department of the Bank of Montreal. We note also that he has turned over a new leaf by abandoning the single state. It is our hope that this event may also turn out to be a promotion, and a long and happy one.

Island papers recently informed us of the appointment of William D. Brennan, B.A., B.Ed., as Inspector of Schools in the province of Saskatchewan. After graduating from St. Dunstan's in nineteen twenty-five Mr. Brennan took his degree in Education and was for a time on the staff of Campion College, Regina. During the last three years he has been assistant principal and science teacher in the Collegiate at Battleford, Sask., the papers of which town say "he has proven an efficient teacher and an enthusiastic and popular leader in collegiate sports and other school activities. He is a young man to secure such recognition as this appointment carries with it." We wish to congratulate him on the attainment of this important position.

## In Memoriam PETER A. McINTYRE

The death occurred early in December, in Dorchester, Mass. of Peter Augustine McIntyre, who was a prominent and popular man in Charlottetown before moving to the United States forty-two years ago. He was born at Cable Head, P. E. I. On the advice of his uncle, Bishop Mc-Intyre, he enrolled at St. Dunstan's at an early age.
