Thanksgiving Day, October 14, marked the opening number of the football program of '19, when our University fifteen lined up against their old time rival, the Abegweits, and demonstrated to a large crowd of excited spectators the truth of a well known maxim, "Practise makes perfect," to the tune of 11-0.

The game all through, consisted mainly of scrimwork and our forwards, for the manner in which they "pushed" things certainly deserve praise. With the ball almost constantly in the Abegweit territory it was not long before it was carried over their goal line, J. Sullivan being the successful Saint in this case. This was followed shortly afterwards by score number two this time by L. McDonald. Neither try was converted and the score stood 6 to o at half time. The second half started with a rush and a strong determination on the part of the Abegweits to even up the score. There is no doubt that their light forward line was a serious handicap and also the fact that they had very little practise previous to this game. Three attempts to get over the Saint's line were unsuccessful and shortly before full time our speedy half, Callagan, secured the pigskin and succeeded in making try number three. On October 23, the football fans of Charlottetown were treated to a good exhibition of the old game when our senior fifteen lined up against a team representing Mt. Allison University of Sackville, N. B.

Despite the inclement weather a large crowd witnessed the defeat of Mt. Alliston by a score of 9—o. From the beginning of the game the St. Dunstan's team showed itself to be far superior to that of the opponents. The first half was mainly scrim work, and the husky forwards of the Saints kept the ball in the Mt. A. territory practically all the time. After about fifteen minutes play L. McDonald, one of our forwards, secured the ball by an intercepted pass and safely carried it over making score number one. A few minutes later P. Sullivan of the half-line, managed to evade his opponents and planted the pigskin again behind the Mt. A. goal line.

The second half was played in the open scrim style and although considerable slack play was made owing to lack of practise in this style of game, the Saints scored again; this time also by our speedy half,

Sullivan.

Although the Mt. A. men did not score, it is no indication of their inability to play the game. Seldom has Saint Dunstan's had the chance to play against

such a bunch of good sports.

After the game the Mt. A. boys were given a reception by the University boys at which they expressed themselves heartily pleased with the spirit of comradeship in the treatment given them by the Saints, and

The first game of the Intercollegiate series was played on the C. A. A. A. grounds on Saturday afternoon, October, 25th, between our second team and the team from Prince of Wales College. One of the largest crowds of spectators witnessing a game in this city for many years was present to see P.W.C. defeated by such a large score. The weather was ideal for football and a good fast game was played by both teams although our team proved superior throughout the entire game in both weight and training.

P.W.C. won the toss for the kick-off and "Chick" Williams sent the ball well into our territory. It was soon returned however, and ten or fifteen minutes of fast football until "Mousie," the captain of our team and star third quarter suffered a slight injury. He soon recuperated however, and play was resumed, when he with increased vigor seized the ball and landed

it safely behind the P.W.C. goal for the first try. The attempt to convert failed and the play continued.

The ball remained in the opponent's territory for some time until Hughes, whose hobby is getting around the scrimmage, seized the ball and breaking through the defences touched it down for try number two. This attempt to convert also failed.

At the beginning of the second half, Craig, the P. W. C. star half-back, who had certainly developed speed overseas. made a beautiful run but was captured in time to avert any damage. After successive attempts to break through our defences, Grady secured the bladder and by a fast run and spectacular dodging succeeded in making try number three.

Again "Mousie" covered himself with glory by attaining his second score which made the fourth "touch" of the game. The fifth and last score was made by Grady who by a beautiful run succeeded in crossing the goal line a fifth time which made his second score. This was converted by a well-judged kick by L. McDonald. The game ended with the score 17—0 in favor of S.D.U.

Although our third quarter secured the ball from nearly every scrimmage it was almost useless to pass to the half line. The opposing halves knew well if S. D. U's half line was once unmuzzled and let loose it would require more than mere human form to arrest them.

At times in both periods the situation seemed extremely dangerous for the "Abbies", and only for the coaching of their veterans it is difficult to say what might have been the score. At one time especially, our quarter, D. McDonald secured the much coveted pigskin and in some manner peculiar to himself, crawled through the melee and crossed the line but upon realizing that he was over came the terrible realization that

he had lost the ball. The only advantage we received from this was a retreat to centre field.

Throughout, the game was mostly a defensive one for our opponents, although at times, it looked as though they had really taken the offensive, still the Saints, always prepared for new tactics, prevented them from even making the situation look dangerous.
