His Excellency, Most Reverend J. A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown, made his official visit to St. Dunstan's on Sept. 20, and celebrated the Sacrifice of the Mass in the college chapel. After Mass, he spoke

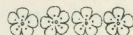
