In their first game, the senior squad swamped the All Stars in an exhibition game on the Saints' gridiron. Although they scored only once in the first half, the Saints walked through their opponents for six tries in the second half. The All Stars, who played surprisingly well, for a team that had had no practice, were no match for the Red and White players when they put on the pressure.

Ten minutes after the opening whistle Frank Alyward,

Saints forward, grabbed the ball from a line up and plunged over for the only try of the first half. The try was not converted. The Saints broke away often after this but could not get through for another score. But in the second half the Saints out-ran the All Stars for six tries. The scoring started when Jack Trainor, fast backfield man, taking the ball at center field, carried it to the All Stars' five yard line where he passed the ball to Hubert O'Hanley who went over for the try. Trainor converted it. The Saints scored again, five minutes later, on a passing attack by the backfield. O'Hanley was on the receiving end and he carried the ball over at the corner.
