UNIVERSITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA:

The national government should have its troubles. UBC's Model Parliament was a succession of verbal brawls and non-confidence votes. UNIVERSITY OF ALBERTA:

A fee hike is in making at the University of Alberta. Dr. Walter Johns, President of the University, said that these increases will be made to meet the increasing costs of running the institution. This would raise the tuition of the Arts, Education, and Physical Education courses from \$250 to \$300. The Commerce and Science students will now pay \$350 and the Engineering courses will be raised from \$340 to \$400. Graduate studies have been raised from \$250 to \$325. It seems that there is austerity in places other than S.D.U.

ROBERT QUIGLEY

Robert Quigley, President of the Students' Union, and a former president of CFCCS has restored unity to the former, and injected new life into the latter. Vibert Rosemay, the first British Guianese to study at St. Dunstan's, has been an intercollegiate debater of note for four years, a competent vice president of the Students' Union in his Junior year, and an energetic editor of Red and White. Having joined the staff of Red and White in its infancy in 1960, he has helped it grow to its present status. Its future growth will be due in part to the foundations Bert has laid.

ELLEN REDDIN

The third gold "D" recipient is Ellen Reddin, a native of Moncton, New Brunswick, but now living at Mount Stewart, P.E.I.

In her freshman year, Ellen was a member of the Girls' debating team which won the Maritime crown for the first time, and for the next two years debated intercollegiately. In addition Ellen served as secretary and later as president of the Debating Society.

In 1961, Ellen joined the staff of Red and White as co-ed editor, and was instrumental in making

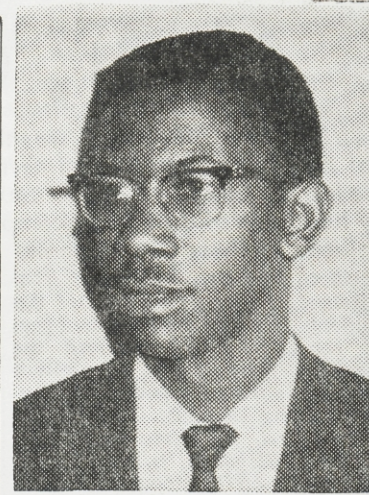

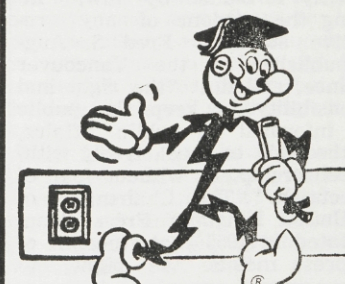
