ATHLETICS

As the College year draws to a close, it is with a touch of pride and some regret that we look back over the sports events of the year. In this as in other years the wearers of the red and white have upheld the high standards of sportsmanship and play which have always characterized Saint Dunstons' teams in the past. Although they were not successful in bringing home any football or hockey titles, the zeal and determination which they displayed have won for them the praise and admiration of all who saw them in action.

Last fall at the annual meeting of the Maritime Inter-collegiate Athletic Union in Truro, the question was raised whether two athletes of this College would be allowed to enter intercollegiate competition. The question was debated and a decision was reached. Before the football series with U. N. B. for the N. B.-P. E. I. title, a protest was received

from the N. B. College regarding the eligibility of the two players; and upon enquiry to the Secretary of the Union, we were informed that, according to the minutes of the meeting, both students in question had been declared eligible only for hockey. At a more recent meeting of the Union it was brought to light, when the minutes of the previous meeting were presented, that both players had been voted eligible for all sports . . . "made eligible for intercollegiate sport", say the minutes. Such a contradiction should not be allowed to go unnoticed. Although the loss of two players probably would not make much difference in a large institution, the withdrawal of two key members from our football team may well have spelled the difference between defeat and victory in the intercollegiate series. We feel that Saint Dunstan's was treated unjustly; and the incident makes us wonder if the M. I. A. U. is not becoming subservient to the larger institutions.

HOCKEY

MARITIME INTERCOLLEGIATE SERIES

On February 15th, the Saints faced off with the Saint Joseph's College team in their first intercollegiate hockey series in five years. The Saints, handicapped by the loss of Cart MacDonald and Mike Hennessey, were defeated 7-1. On the following Tuesday the Saints played host to the U. S. J. squad, and again bowed in defeat to a superior team. It was a triple victory for Saint Joseph's; they won the game 6-2, took the series 13-3, and won the right to meet U. N. B. in the N. B.-P. E. I. finals.

While we are on the subject of intercollegiate sport we should recommend that the M. I. A. U. make a stipulation that henceforth teams which are admitted to intercollegiate competition be required to guarantee their participation in the finals. This year the well-balanced, smooth-working St. Joseph's team, after eliminating the Saints, went on to win the N. B.-P. E. I. title by defeating the U. N. B. squad; and they thereby qualified to meet the Saint Francis Xavier team in the Maritime finals. But for reasons known only to themselves, they defaulted the series, and with it the Maritime Championship. Admitting that St. F. X. definitely had championship material, the fortunes of battle are such that it is not unreasonable to suppose that the U. S. J. team might have taken the Maritime title. In any case, it should not be possible for a team to become Maritime Champions by default, after winning only a one province title.

Since the primary purpose of the M. I. A. U. is to promote intercollegiate athletic competition and not merely

to crown the Maritime Champions, we hope that a recurrence of this year's play-off procedure will be avoided in the future.

The first game of the semi-finals got unnder way with a scoreless first period which featured close checking by both teams. At the half-way mark Mahar and MacDonald again combined, but this time with MacDonald flashing the red light to make the score read 2-0. At the fifteen minute mark B. Dowling picked up a loose puck in the Saints' territory and beat MacKinnon from close range.

The third period opened fast with M. Dowling getting two goals in less than a minute to put the Legionnaires in the lead, but their advantage was short-lived, for forty seconds later Mahar evened the score on a pass from MacDonald. The Legionnaires fought back, and in less than a minute M. Dowling again flipped the disc into the cage to reclaim the one goal lead. Both teams fought furiously for the greater part of the period, until at the seventeen minute mark Mahar banged in the equalizer on a combined play with MacDonald and MacIsaac. As the last few minutes of

the period were slipping away it looked as if the game would go into over-time, but at 19.56 B. Dowling slapped in Worth's pass-out from behind the net to clinch the game in the dying moments.

LEGIONNAIRES—7

The Saints evened the series in the second game with an 8-7 victory over the Legion squad. Going into the third period on the short end of a 4-2 score, the Saints opened up and, outscoring their opponents 6-3, forced the series into a third and deciding game.

Play was wide open and rugged during the first five minutes of the first period until Strain slipped in M. Dowling's pass to put the Legionnaires on the score-board. For the next ten minutes the Saints put on the pressure in an effort to tie it up, but Cudmore was equal to the occasion and out-guessed his opponents on several attempts. At 15.11 Dowling slammed in Perry's pass after the latter had rounded the S. D. U. defence to make it 2-0.

In the second period the teams split four goals evenly. Cart MacDonald tallied first when he slapped in his own rebound, after Cudmore had beaten him on his first shot; but the Legionnaires regained their two goal lead three minutes later when B. Dowling scored from Carver and Shepherd. For the next ten minutes they played scoreless hockey until at 15.02 Strain got his second goal of the game as he batted in M. Dowling's pass. Joe Mahar wound up the scoring of the second session when he whipped in Cart MacDonald's pass from close range.

Facing elimination, the Saints came out in the final canta and pulled the game out of the fire in the last five minutes. The Saints struck at 1.07 with Mahar on the scoring end of a passing play with MacDonald and MacAdam; but M. Dowling nullified their attempt a minute later when he beat MacKinnon from close range. During the next 3 minutes the Saints evened the count; MacDougall scored from Rodgers, and Ledwell banged home the equalizer on a pass from MacDougall. A minute later MacDonald sent S. D. U. to the front as he caged Cameron's pass; but the Veterans took the offensive and regained the lead as M. Dowling scored twice in succession. Rodgers back-handed the tying goal into the net thirty seconds later on a pass from MacDonald, and the latter shot the winning tally at 18.32 on a play set up by Cameron.

The Saints bowed out of the play-offs in the last game of the semi-finals in a fast wide-open encounter that saw the fortunes of battle favor first one team and then the

other. Down three goals going into the final session, the Legionnaires went on a scoring spree and counted four times to take the game and the series.

For the first two periods the MacDonald - Mahar - Cameron line counted six times and MacDougall scored unassisted to give the Saints a 7-3 lead. M. Dowling and Carver were the marksmen for the Legion. The score was tied at 3-3 at the end of the first period, but in the second session the Saints outscored their opponents 4 to 1 to take a commanding lead in the final game.

It was in the last half of the third period, after a ten minute break while Cudmore had an injury treated, that the Legionnaires hit the jack-pot. The Dowling - Perry - Worth line, which in the first two periods had been held down to two goals, hit their stride during those last ten minutes and broke through the S. D. U. defence to ride in on MacKinnon, who performed magnificently but was not able to halt the Legion drive. M. Dowling banged in three goals and got an assist on the fourth, while the Legion defence tightened up and held the onrushing Saints at bay.

The game was a fitting finale to a series which brought forth such a high grade of hockey from both squads. Although defeated, the Saints were very much in the running until the last; and it was only with the final bell that the Legionnaires were assured of their victory.
