

Saints Loose Squeaker To UNB; 2-1 Won-Lost Record On Season

The S.D.U. football Saints met their first defeat of the season at the hands of the U.N.B. Red Bombers in Fredericton last Saturday. The Saints' defensive squad was not up to par as they provided inadequate pass coverage

and were unable to complete their tackles. Consequently the U.N.B. backfielders were able to slip through for long gains. The U.N.B. squad was strong offensively, making long and important gains both in the air and on the ground. A few of the bright spots on the Saints' defense were Dermie Kinsella, Joe MacGuire, and Bobby Driscoll. Driscoll on one occasion intercepted a Red Bomber pass which would have otherwise gone for a touchdown.

Despite the fact that the Saints' defense left a little to be desired, the offensive

squad, led by the spectacular play of quarterback Jim Foley, played a strong game. Foley, playing his usual fine rushing game, scored two of the Saints' touchdowns, while throwing to his ace receiver Owen Jay for for a third. Jack Sands, the Saints' wingback, took a hand off from Foley and threw a perfect pass to fleeting end, Jay, for an easy touchdown. Also playing a strong offensive game for the Saints were halfback Jerry Lajeunesse, fullback C.Y. MacDonald, and centre Len Gaudet. Guards Bob Hickey and Steve Clarkson also played their usual fine game.

It was an exciting game all the way, and it was only in the dying minutes that the contest was decided. And by no means does this loss mean the end of our tough little football squad. Their chances

Track Team Wins Two Firsts

For the second time in less than two weeks weather conditions marred a Maritime intercollegiate championship tournament. This time the victim was the track and field tournament. The meet was held in Halifax on Wednesday, October 18, under 30 M.P.H. winds and a steady rain.

However, in spite of the weather and the small team sent over by Saint Dunstan's, only four members, the Red and White squad turned in a very decent performance. Our team won two firsts, a second and a third. Bill MacKinnon won the hundred yard dash with a time of 10.4 sec. Bill also came second in the 220 with a time of 23.4 sec. On account of three lanes on the track being under water, both the 100 and 220 were run in heats and the best times were selected. If it had been a straight race, MacKinnon could easily have won the 220 also as his time was only one tenth of a second slower than the winner.

Getting the other first for the Saints was Chris Annett who won the triple jump with a leap of 41' 11". Annett also came third in the broad jump, with a jump of 19' 5". The pole vaule event was washed out, which prevented Joe Cheverie from winning valuable points for S.D.U.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

The old adage, "history repeats itself," proved true last Saturday when the U.N.B. Red Bombers outlasted the S.D.U. Saints in a regularly scheduled Bluenose Football Conference tilt. One year ago, the Saints lost to U.N.B. in the final minute of the game. This season, the Saints were leading 27-26 with five minutes remaining in the game but again, they lost as the Red Bombers scored two touchdowns in the final five minutes. This was a big game for the Red & White squad, and the loss was a bitter pill for the players, coaches, and fans. However, the football picture for our team is still bright. We were aided in our drive for one of the two playoff spots by Dalhousie's upset win over St. Mary's. As it stands now, S.D.U., "X", Acadia and U.N.B. are in a tie for first place, with four points each, while S.M.U. haven't any points after two games. However, St. Mary's, U.N.B., and St. F.X. have played only two games thus far. A very exciting few weeks looms ahead for the Bluenose league, since any one of the five above-mentioned teams could walk off with all the marbles.

S.D.U. is idle this weekend. However, all will be intently watching the outcome of the U.N.B. - Acadia game which promises to be the biggest game in the conference this weekend. If the Red Bombers win, they would have a 3-0 record, with three games remaining. However, if Acadia comes out on top, U.N.B. would have a 2-1 record, and the Axemen, with only two games remaining in the schedule, would still only have six points.

FOLEY LEADING SCORER

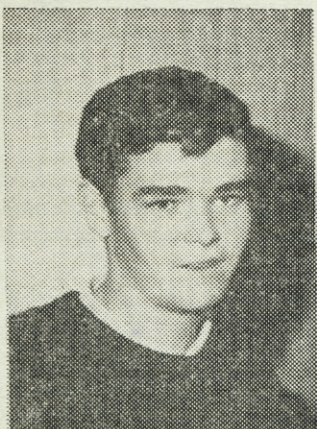
Jim Foley, who has been playing tremendous ball for the Saints all season, is also the top point getter in the league. After three games Jim has 49 points on the basis of seven touchdowns and seven successful convert attempts. His closest rivals is one of his own teammates, Owen Jay, and Terry Arnsen of St. F.X. who are tied for second spot with 24 points apiece. Jay, who is having his finest season for S.D.U., has hands like glue when it comes to pulling down passes. This fact is easily proven by the very fine receptions, four of which have gone for T.D.'s that Owen has made this season.

But all will agree that Foley is the spark plug of the team; this is the man who makes the Saints click. Not only does he lead the Saints offensively, but in addition, he comes off the bench time and time again to make key defensive plays that halt the drive of the opposing team. An excellent example of this occurred in the Mt. A. games when Foley came off the bench and intercepted a Mount Allison pass on the Saints three yard line. If Jim's performance in the Saints' remaining games is anything closely approximating his play in the past three, he should be a sure bet to win the MVP award for the second year in succession.

The Saint Dunstan's basketball team has started practice for the coming season under assistant coach Len Sirois, who will handle the coaching duties while head coach Ed Hilton is engaged with the gridiron squad. At present there are ten players out, however, this number is expected to increase to fourteen or fifteen with the return of several players who are playing football.

The Saints' hockey squad have been running and performing other physical exercises under the watchful eye of Coach Kane for the past few days. Weather Conditions Mar M.I.A.A. Golf Championship at Fredericton

At the Fredericton Golf Club on Monday, October 9, under playing conditions that were far from ideal, the S.D.U. golf team placed fifth in the field of eight teams in the MIAA golf championships. In placing fifth, the Saints' players shot a combined total of 351. U.N.B., the host club won the championship with a score of 307. The other clubs which finished ahead of S.D.U., were St. F.X. 333, S.M.U. 334, and Dalhousie with 337. The Saints finished ahead of Mt. A., St. Thomas and Memorial.

In individual scoring the

S.D.U. club was led by Ernie Corrigan who shot a very respectable 79. Corrigan also finished in fifth spot in the individual rankings. The other members of the Red & White club were Ron Garrett, who shot an 83; Bob Irwin with 85, and Leigh Forbes who shot 104. The top golfer of the tournament was Kees Huibers, of the U.N.B. team who shot a lowly 72.

The inclement weather conditions, 50 degrees weather and a steady rain was a significant factor in the showing of the S.D.U. club. Under better conditions both Garrett and Irwin would have shot better as their scores in this tournament were in no way indicative of the skill of these two boys.

When asked to comment on the tournament, team captain Ernie Corrigan had this to say, "We would have done better if the weatherman had been kinder. However the U.N.B. club, playing on their home course was very good and their top golfer Huibers was by far the best golfer in the tournament".

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
