The few months, that have passed since the second term began, have been the season for skating and hockey. Canada's national game, as hockey may well be termed, has always been popular at St. Dunstan's, and the season now drawing to a close was no exception to this rule.

Immediately upon the re-opening of College after the Christmas Holidays, an energetic rink committee went to work and, although the weather was at first unfavourable, soon had a splendid sheet of ice. No sooner was this done than hockey began.

A number of candidates for first team positions turned out for practice under the supervision of Rev. R. V. Mc-Kenzie, as coach. This number was in a short time cut down, and the members of the team definitely chosen, after which the conditioning process went on more rapidly.

The team entered the City League, and played its first game with the Abbies on Tuesday, January 29. Intermural hockey began Friday, January 25.

As far as winning games goes, our first team did not have a very successful season, but they put up a game fight and made their opponents extend themselves to the utmost to gain the victory. In their first three games they were just nosed out by one goal, and at times outshone their opponents in stickhandling and checking; but luck seemed to be against them. At any rate they showed themselves good losers, accepting defeat in a manner befitting real sportsmen.

Abbies—2. S. D. U.—1.


The line-up was the same as for the previous game.
